

In a unique scheme, believed to be the first of its kind, a voluntary organisation will soon start building a mini-village for old people in Anagaire. The "village", consisting of 10 cottages and a Day Centre is the brainchild of Anagaire Geriatric Association who have formed a sub-committee to raise the £150,000 needed for the project. A site has been acquired beside the Anagaire Cope, fund-raising activities have commenced and it is hoped to start building work as soon as possible.

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The cottages will be designed specifically for old people e.g. there will be no steps, doors will be wider to accomodate wheelchairs, water taps will be adapted to make it easier for old people to use them, etc. In the Day Centre the old people will be able to see the doctor, the priest can hear confessions and they will be able to watch T.V. and socialize. The North Western Health Board have promised to provide a staff of two on a full-time basis for the scheme. Committee members, Dr. Bonner, Nurse Gallagher, Anthony (an Bhainne) O'Donnell, Timmy McBride (Fforghlan) and Seamus (Peter) Boyle would greatly appreciate your donations and hope the people of the area will support their fundraising campaign in the months ahead. Before You 'Take the Plunge'...

Did you know that 40 percent of the people who drown each year were swimming or playing in the water for recreation?

Drownings can occur to anyone anyplace there is water, so here are some safety hints you need to know before going swimming:

1. Learn to swim well. People who are poor swimmers or who can't swim at all account for most drownings. Get instruction from a qualified instructor.

2. Don't swim alone — swim only with someone who would be able to help you if necessary.

3. Obey the rules and regulations of the pool or beach where you are swimming.

4. Don't rely on inflated tubes, rafts or other floating objects. These cannot take the place of good swimming ability. 5. Avoid swimming immediately after eating. Don't go into the water when you are overheated, or you'll risk getting cramps. If you do get a cramp, don't panic. Try stretching the area of your body that is cramped and call for help.

6. Don't dive into unknown water — especially head first. Make sure the water is deep enough for safe diving.

7. Don't swim under diving boards or platforms. You can't depend upon the diver seeing you first.

 8. Don't stay in the water too long. When you become tired or chilled, get out of the water, warm up and rest.
9. Don't overestimate your


9. Don't overestimate your ability. Know what you can and cannot do. If you want to learn something new, learn it from an instructor.



A few days ago I came across an advertisement in a local newspaper. It was to join the Ulster Defence Regiment in the North. Nothing peculiar about that, you may say. But in that advert. there was a sketch portraying a U.D.R. man with a rifle, and the caption above him read "Work for Feace." The thought that dawned on me was - how can one work for a just peace with a gun in one's hand? With of course the exception of a just war. That is one question I'd like answered.

People throughout the world today are talking and yearning for peace. First let us ask ourselves - What is peace? The answer, according to my dictionary, is: "calm, freedom from war, quietness of mind, peacable, disposed to peace, a peacemaker." The Bible tells us - "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God." There is peace needed throughout the entire world. Perhaps more needed today than ever. There are a lot of things which keep the pathway to peace blocked. Here are just a few examples: The Hiroshima disaster in Japan, near the end of the last World War. America dropped the Atomic Bomb, and the blast

wiped out two-thirds of that city and killed nearly one hundred thousand people, on August 6th, 1945. There are people there today still dying from the effects. We must never allow a thing such as that ever to happen again. But how? The large nations have the A-bomb and the H-bomb. Man in his own weakness created them. But we must try and stop those nations from using them. Nearer home. In fact, in our own country, there is a need for peace. A peace with justice in the Six Northern

Counties.

WHAT IS JUSTICE?

That peace with justice was being kept from the people by the establishment, the British Army and illegal organisations Now that we've reached this point we may ask ourselves-what is justice? Answer-equality; being fair, right, and proper. The Establishment was unjust and unfair in the extreme when they introduced internment without trial. British Army and the R.U.C. had the power to lift and intern any person for any period of time under the Special Powers Act. It meant that the victims would be imprisoned without a trial, warrant or judgement. It is a negation of justice and perversion of the rule of law, therefore blocking the way to peace because of its injustice. The brutality of the internment camps was a form of violence and injustice. The British Army were sent to the North in 1969 as a peacekeeping force. How long did they remain such a force? Bloody Sunday is one example. Violence will bring no lasting peace. Problems of injustice aren't going to be solved by fighting. The keeping of human and civil rights from people is unjust and blocking the way to peace. Human rights are violated by race and religious discrimination by governments that consider that man exists for the State, not the State for man. STATESENT BY BISHOPS

A statement on civil violence a few years ago by the Bishops of England and Wales said: "Many use force to achieve reform. It will not do merely to condemn the use of violence against authority, since evidently those in authority may themselves be guilty of worse violence in the legislation they enforce. This question therefore, cannot be answered simply by indiscriminate condemnation. It is obvious that in some cases citizens can never obtain justice by peaceful, democratic means. Where protest against injustice has been stilled by promises of redress which by peaceful, democratic means. Where protest against injustice has been stilled by promises of redress which remain unfulfilled, it is governments who bear the heaviest responsibility for violence which may break out. The logical conclusion to civil violence is civil war. The bitterness between brothers, the scars and hatred left by civil war, remain for generations. We must cherish freedom, which depends on just laws and true democracy." Each of us must make some contribution to peace, and true peace begins in our own hearts. We must work to make others get their just rights. We must banish from our hearts all thoughts of hatred, bitterness and revenge. FRACE NOT INFOSSIBLE

To work for peace is very hard indeed-impossible? No. It needs patience, perseverance, straighness, honest firmness to create the basic foundations of peace, and to eliminate injustice, and remove hostility and fear. It needs patience, perseverance, straighness, honesty and A lot of conferences are broken because different parties believe that they alone have all the answers to the problems. A peacemaker must work to bring harmony, trust and co-operation. Energy to achieve the common good of all, and se-cure the human rights of each person. There can be no lasting peace in the world unless there is peace in the hearts of men. No one can work for peace by breaking God's law and proclaiming their own. St. Fatrick changed all the pagans in Ireland to Christians by using these methods, not by gun or bomb. The I.R.A.

should change their revolution into a mass peaceful political one, and achieve victory, peace and justice. "We can never find peace in violence, only in a spirit of brotherhood".


