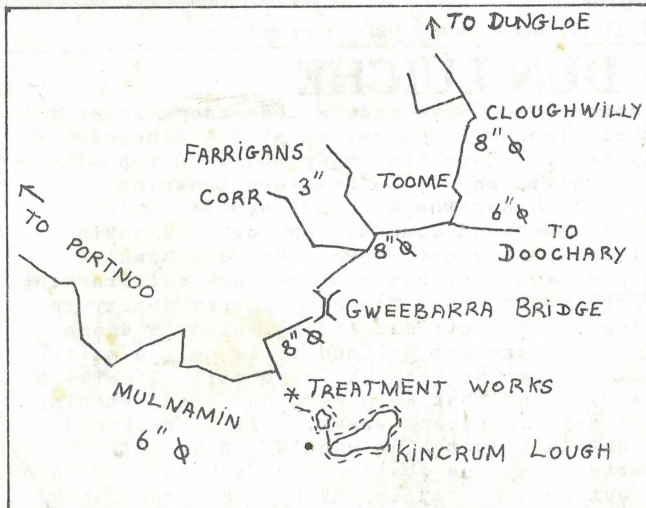
LEITIR'S WHITE ELEPHANT

This month sees the commissioning of the new water headworks at Kinrum, Leitir macáird. The installation is a compact site consisting of a Dam and intake at Lough Derk, a $\frac{1}{4}$ m. gallon Reservoir, Settling-Tank, Fitters and a Treatment building which controls the whole operation. Built at a cost of approximately $\pounds\frac{1}{2}$ million, the Head-Works has already been supplying the Portnoo - Ardara district since the Summer.

However, residents north of the Gweebarra feel that they have been badly let down. The mains-pipe crossed the Bridge early this year but came to an abrupt halt 200 yards on. A massive group-scheme was to lay the 20 mile network of pipe which would carry the water to the 300 or so householders in the area. It is only now that work is commencing on this section and it is felt that it will be at least early 1985 before "Kilcrin's" white elephant will be able to supply water to the people of Leitir.

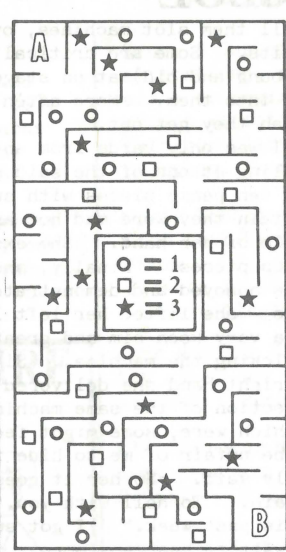

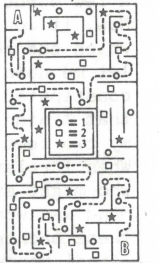

WHERE IS EVOLUTION LEAST EVIDENT?

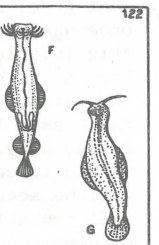
Some creatures have shown VERY LITTLE EVOLUTION over millions of years. A MOLUCCAS LOBSTER (A), compared here to that found today (B) in Indonesian waters shows little significant difference.



THE TEREBRATULA SHELLFISH (C), 150 million years old, looks much like that now found (D) in the Mediterranean Sea.



THE NAUTILUS (E) lives in the Indian Ocean. These cuttlefish have been TRACED BACK 420 million years.



THE WORM (F) existed 550 million years ago and (G) is found in our oceans today.

Few animals of the sea have been subject to drastic changes in evolution than those on land, because the sea has reflected LESS CHANGE IN ENVIRONMENT.

A World at War

• Would you call a war being fought in 40 countries by four million soldiers a world war? If so, then World War III is already here.

Researchers in Washington, D.C., say more than one fourth of the earth's 164 nations are at war. Most of the wars are small, having little effect on people outside of the war zone. But some of them are large, leaving millions of people dead, wounded or homeless.

Any of these wars, say the researchers, could be the spark that ignites a nuclear world war.

Here is a quick look at some of the larger wars being fought.

Cambodia — As many as four million people have died in this war since 1970.

Afghanistan — When the Soviet Union invaded this country in 1978, it encountered tough resistance from Afghan guerrillas. About 100,000 people have been killed.

Iran/Iraq — Long-standing religious differences have made these two Islamic countries traditional enemies. The war has claimed 80,000 lives since 1980.

El Salvador — 25,000 government soldiers have been battling 10,000 guerrillas. The result: 30,000 Salvadorans dead since 1977.

Lebanon — Four armies have been waging war here leaving 80,000 dead since 1975.

Make Your Clothes Last Longer

Clothes just don't last as long as they should. With the high clothing costs today, that can mean a large bite out of the money you'd rather spend on something else.

Here are some things we can do to make sure our clothes last as long as possible:

1. Don't overload the washing machine — clothes will not come out clean, fabrics will wear out faster.
2. Immediately after taking

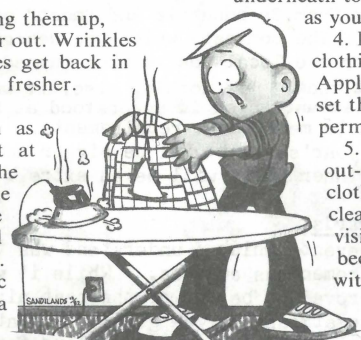
clothes off, hang them up, letting them air out. Wrinkles fall out, clothes get back in shape and look fresher.

3. Remove stains as soon as possible. Start at the edge of the spot and sponge toward the center to avoid forming a ring. Rub fabric gently, using a

cloth pad or paper towel underneath to absorb the stain as you work.

4. Don't press clothing that is soiled. Applying heat could set the stains permanently.

5. Store out-of-season clothing spotlessly clean — even barely visible stains can become noticeable with age.

Advice on Preparing and Cooking Turkey

Many food poisoning outbreaks associated with consumption of turkey meat occur because of defective handling procedures. To minimise the risk involved the following advice is offered.

Hand-Washing: When handling the turkey — both in its uncooked and cooked state — it is important to ensure that hands are washed.

Surfaces and Equipment: Surfaces and equipment should be thoroughly clean at all stages of the preparation, carving etc. of turkey.

FROZEN TURKEYS

Thawing: Remove polythene wrapping from the turkey. Place frozen turkey in a cool well ventilated place. Allow to thaw out completely. Ensure that drip from the thawing bird does not come in contact with other foods.

The following times are recommended for thawing frozen turkey.

Weight 10lbs. Time 24 hrs. approximately.

Weight 15lbs. Time 36 - 48 hrs. approximately

A large turkey can take approximately 72 hours to thaw out completely. The use of hot or cold water to speed up thawing is not recommended as this increases the possibility of contamination.

After Thawing: Remove giblets from the body cavity. Wash and wipe turkey dry. The use of disposable kitchen towels is preferable for wiping turkey but if cloths must be used they should be sterilised, before and after use, by boiling or by using bleach solution.

Where possible cook immediately the preparation is completed.

PRE-COOKED STORAGE

In exceptional cases where it is not possible to cook the bird immediately store in a refrigerator or other cool clean place. Ensure that it does not come in contact with other foods.

Cooking: Preheat the oven to the required temperature. Cook for 20 minutes per lb. at 300° - 325°, gas mark 2 - 3 (145°C).

After Cooking: Where possible, serve the turkey when freshly cooked. Apart from the desirable quality of freshly cooked meat, the danger of food poisoning is significantly reduced by serving in such condition.

AFTER COOKING STORAGE

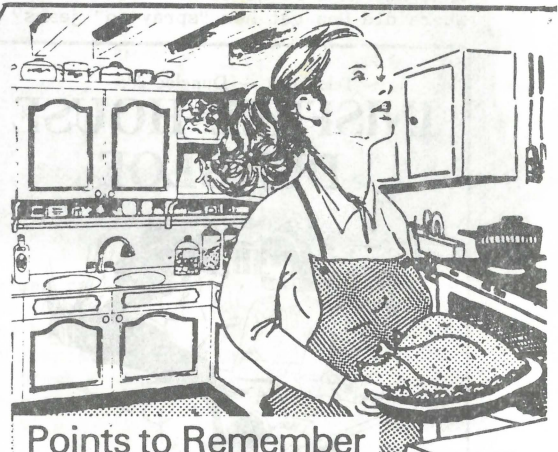
If turkey is not eaten immediately, cool rapidly in a well-ventilated room and refrigerate where possible.

Cold Turkey: Only remove the cold turkey from storage when required for carving and serving. Return unused balance to storage immediately. Exercise strict care in handling, carving and plating.

Gravy: Use hot gravy with hot meat but not with cold meat.

Reheating: If reheating slices of cooked turkey, ensure that temperature is adequate, e.g. 212°F (100°C) for 3 - 5 minutes.

Note: The advice given above applies also in the preparation, use and storage of all poultry and meats.

**Points to Remember**

- (1) Remove wrapping, thaw completely.
- (2) Remove giblets.
- (3) Wash and wipe; use disposable kitchen towels — clean all surfaces and equipment.
- (4) Cook for 20 minutes per lb. at 300° - 325°F, Gas mark 2-3 (145°C).
- (5) Cook stuffing separately.
- (6) If not eaten immediately, cool rapidly in a well-ventilated room and refrigerate.
- (7) When cold, store separate from uncooked food.
- (8) If reheating slices of cooked turkey, ensure that temperature is adequate, e.g. 212°F (100°C) for 3 - 5 minutes.
- (9) When carving, working surfaces and equipment should be thoroughly clean.
