SHOPPING SURVEY

Our survey of shop prices has finally got off the ground this month, and according to your letters it is creating much interest. It is however very difficult to carry out such a complex survey, so in the short space of time available to us this month we can only paint a very brief picture. We are however going to continue monthly with this column so we'd welcome your ideas and opinions. A small grocer wrote to us as follows:

"I am writing in protest at the survey that you have started. I am dependant on the small takings that I have nowadays due to most people shopping in the supermarkets. I feel your survey is not very fair as you cannot compare a small grocery business with a large supermarket. I only buy small amounts at a time whereas the large Mace, M.N.C., etc, stores can buy vast amounts at very keen prices. When I buy my goods I add V.A.T. + a small percentage profit, e.g. less than 1p profit on milk, 1-2p on a loaf. It's hardly worth our while selling these things at all. I feel in all fairness that you should exclude the small shopkeepers from your survey as it could ruin our livelihood. I'd be grateful if your readers would consider our predicament - we cannot compete with the larger stores price-wise. On the other hand, what supermarket gives you such a good service? We are open from 8 or 9 a.m. until late at night, 7 days a week usually. And where else would you get credit? Not in the supermarkets. (people) have short memories). Please consider our plight before you add to our extinction".

We agree, but I think most people accept that the small shops are dearer but people are willing to pay for a special service.

We have in fact concentrated (this month at least) on the larger stores. We picked a list of basic foodstuffs and selected what we considered to be the most popular brand names. Then we sent this list of items to people in the 3 parishes who agreed to carry out the survey for us. They checked the prices between Saturday 12th September and Saturday 19, but unfortunately we found that many brands and items were not available in certain shops. Therefore we could not get a total cost for our shopping bag. Some items, like tea (which incidentally went up during our survey) don't vary as they are price-marked on all their goods so we cannot give you any information on them at this stage. Also, we cannot over-rule the possibility of mistakes being made by (a) our volunteers, (b) the shops themselves. Add to this the fact that special offers are sometimes available and that stamps are available in some shops and you can see how complex the job is.

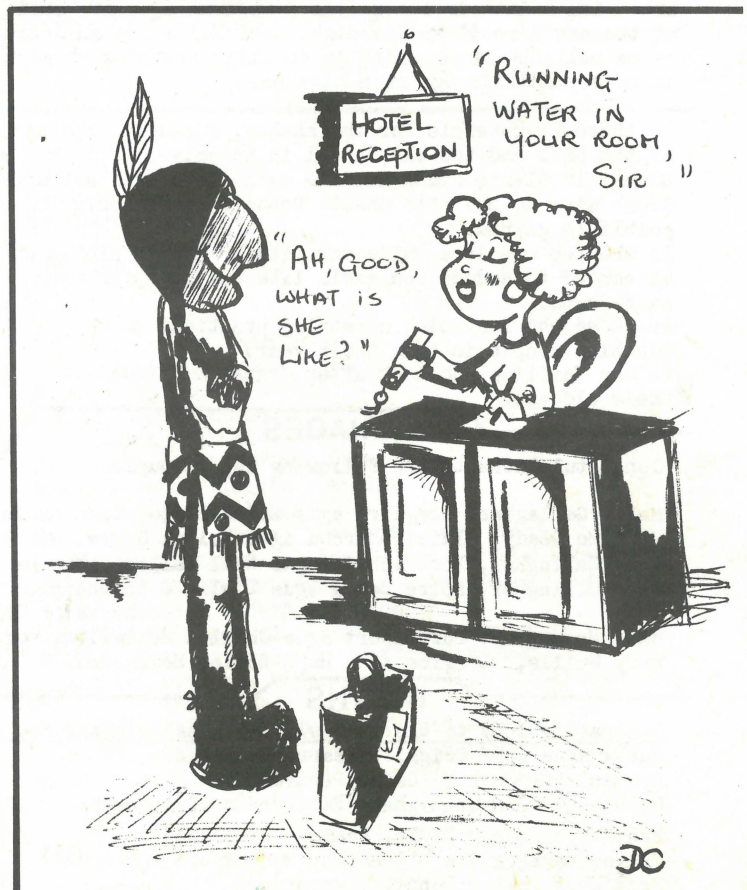

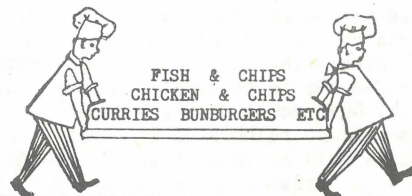

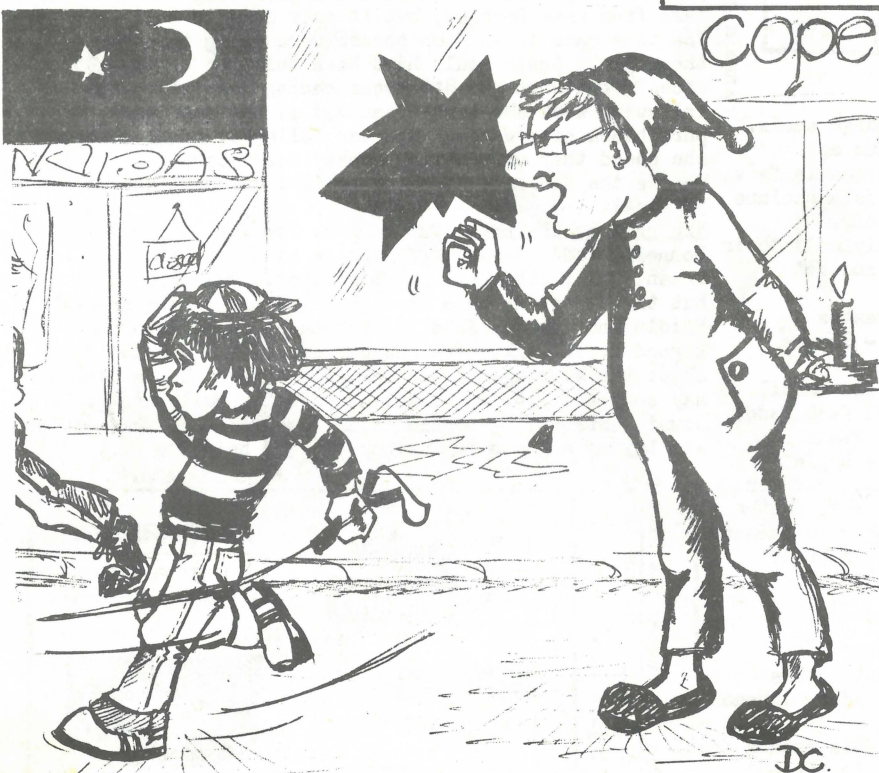

SPECIAL POTATO SCONES

½ cup oatmeal 1 lb potatoes
2 oz. plain flour salt

Mash potatoes, then add a little salt and the oatmeal. Knead in as much flour as mixture will take up. Roll out very thinly and cut into triangles. Prick all over with a fork. Brown on a girdle or frying pan, turning once. Serve hot, spread with butter.

Note: The secret of light potato scones is to bake them while the potatoes are still hot.



HANDY TIPS FOR THE KITCHEN

Reviving cheese and ham Cheese that has gone hard as wood can be freshened as follows. Steep a rag in white wine and ring it out well. Wrap it around the cheese and leave it for several hours until the cheese has softened. Dried out sliced ham will regain its suppleness and flavour if you leave it to soak in a little milk for 10 minutes.

Renovating silk - Sponge the garment gently all over with warm soap suds on a flat, hard surface. Then dry it thoroughly by rubbing it gently with a clean, soft cloth. Iron on the wrong side with the iron at its lowest setting. Alternatively, iron on the right side over tissue paper.

Care of woollens - A woollen garment will remain soft when you hand-wash it if you add 1 teaspoon of vinegar to the penultimate rinse and ½ teaspoon of glycerine to the last rinse. You can 'dry shampoo' white woollen garments using flour or French chalk. Sprinkle this over the garment and then rub it as you would if you were washing it. Shake out the flour or chalk as soon as it becomes grey and repeat the process until it remains white.

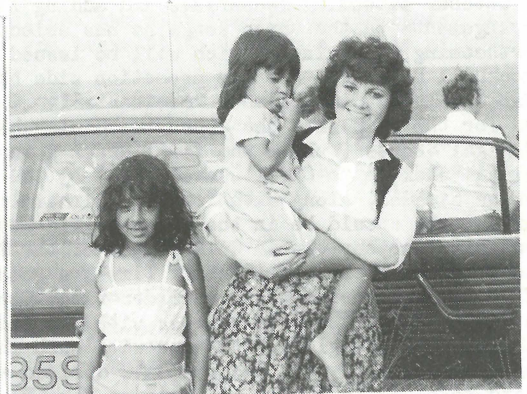

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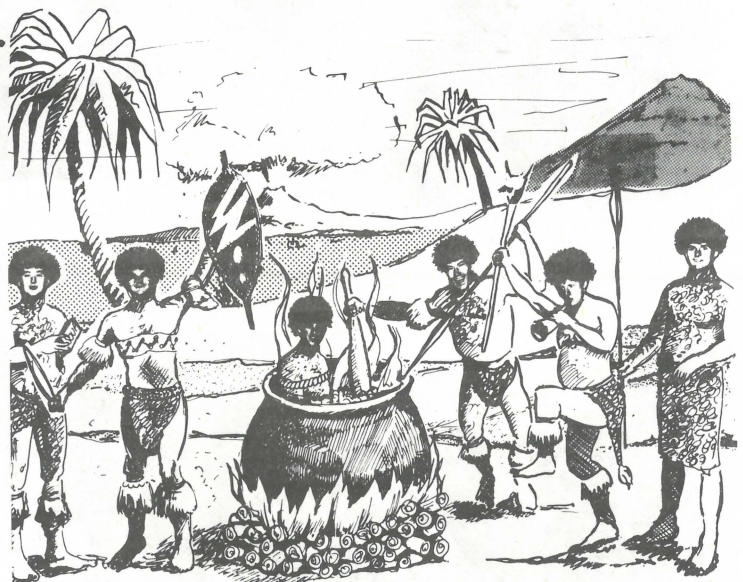

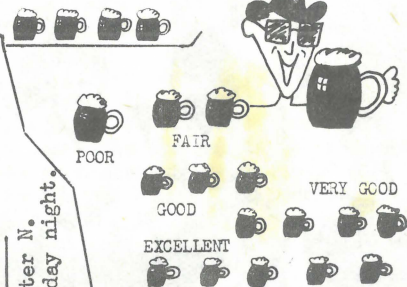
Pub Grub

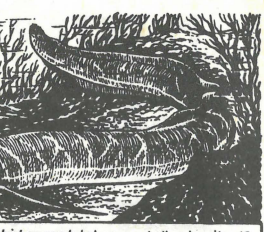

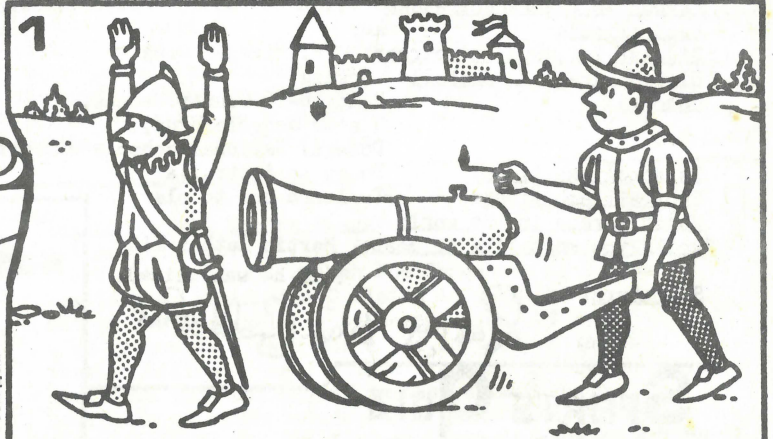


When its home becomes dry, it digs a U-shaped hole in the soft mud.

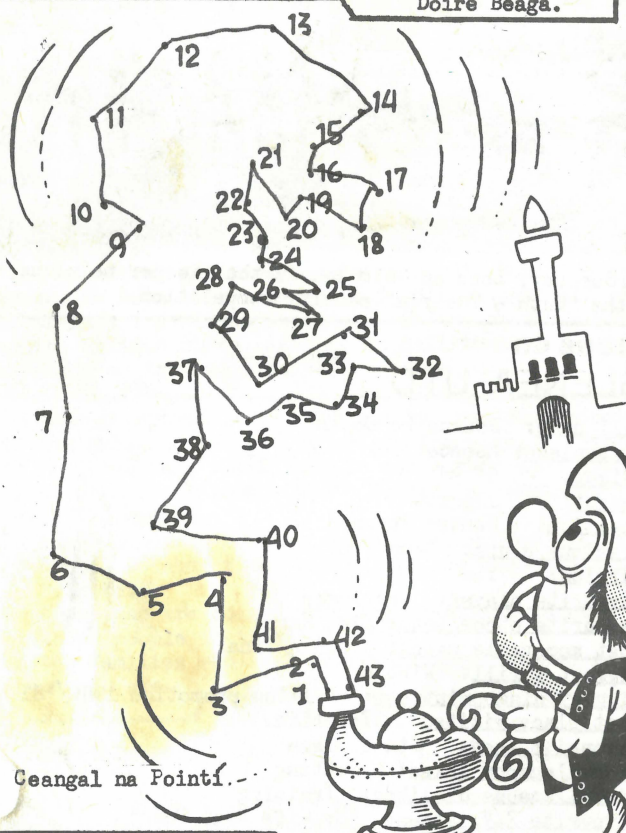
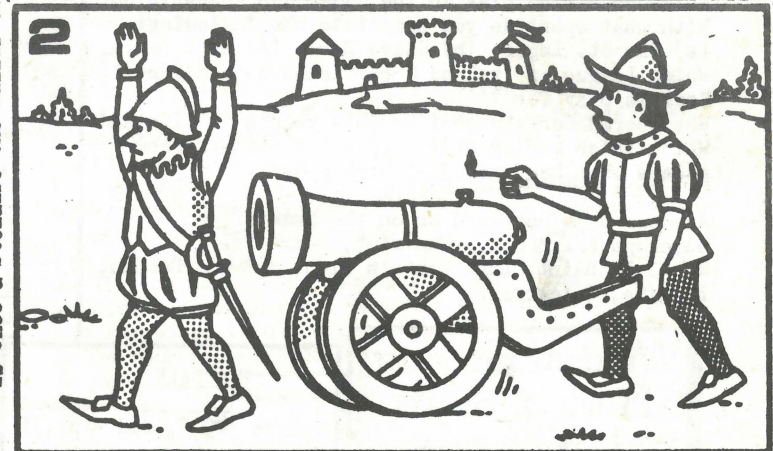
Then it folds itself up in this cavity and fluid secreted by its body, causes the water in the hole to become slimy and eventually solid.
