
The entire Industrial Estate, known locally as "an Screaban" is fenced off except for three entrances. The main entrance, facing Machaire Chlochair remains open all the time but two other entrances which take you on to Cois Cládaigh and Carraic a'tSeascáin are shut outside normal working hours. Local people and workers are annoyed by the inconvenience Local people of the closed gates and point out that the area now blocked by Gaeltarra is a "right of way", has been for years and that they have no legal right to interfere. They also claim They also claim that closing the gates would not seriously deter anybody intent on stealing anything from the estate because the main entrance remains wide open and anyway it would only take two minutes to remove the lock and open the gates. It is also claimed that most of the theft took place during normal working hours so that it was an internal problem, and also that the onus was on the building contractors like Walls to provide adequate security on their sites, e.g. by fencing off the building area normal practice on similar sites elsewhere.

They say it would not be practical to store building material, etc. in a compound every night. They also point out that they are providing pedestrian access to the estate. The "right of way" issue is very complicated but they say there was never more than a broken track there one of several which criss-crossed the area now covered by the estate.





SALUTE TO MANUS MCCOLE

whenever mention is made of Keadue Rovers in Donegal football circles, the name of one man inevitably crops up -For over ten years now it has been synonymous with Keadue Rovers on football grounds around the Manus McCole. county, where the sight of Manus shouting instructions to his team from his wheelthair or car has become common

place. The history of Keadue Rovers goes back to the end of the last century. It's past had been long and glorious. Yet, in 1969, it seemed ahat all the Rovers had was a past. The future of the club was very uncertain mainly due to a lack of players who wanted to play in the famous red and white. In the spring of that year it was decided that it was just not feasible to enter a side in that season's North-West Donegal League.

But in the summer of that year a North-West Donegal Under-16 League was introduced. Manus McCole entered a te of young lads from the area stretching from Acres to Kincasslagh. That was his initiation into the sphere of Manus McCole entered a team

football management, and it was this experience that made him question whether he could, in fact, run a team in

the senior league.

Manus and I often discussed the problems involved in such a venture and the chances of succeeding. remember the spring evening in 1970 when we set off to form a committee which was to be the foundation stone of It turned out to be the start of a decade of hard work with many set-backs and frustrations the new Keadue Rovers. for Manus. But it was also a period when Manus revealed a firm resolve and unyielding determination which eventually was to take his side on to win the Donegal League championship.

So after one year's lapse Keadue Rovers were back in existence. The North-West Donegal League was, however, to In its final term, internal disagreement prevented the League's completion - and last only two more seasons. that in a season that had seemed destined to land Manus his first triumph as football manager. He had assembled an outstanding team that won a tremendous succession of victories before the league ended inconclusively to deny

the Rovers what seemed a certain championship.

The break-up of the North-West League was to coincide with the formation of the Donegal League. For the first time teams from all over the county would compete together in a single tournament. After finishing in the top six in the first season of the new league, the loss of several key players meant that Keadue were no longer in a position to compete with the top sides. Manus was faced with a major set-back. As a result it was decided to position to compete with the top sides. Manus was faced with a major set-back. As a result it was decided to relegate the team voluntarily to the second division to give the young players coming through a chance to mature. There then followed a few mediocre seasons in the lower division and at times the whole future of Keadue Rovers



11 Accident Black spot



We again return to Cloich Cheann Fhaola this month. Up until now most Black Spots featured in this paper have either been places I have been asked to investigate or else they were personal observations However, this month's Black I have come across. Spot was found en route to investigate another Black Spot! I was taking the coast road down to Machaire Rabhartaigh after coming from Gort a'Choirce and turning down by the grotto at Ardsbeg/Derryconnor. It appears to be a very good road, with a fine surface until about & mile on one suddenly comes over a slight hump into a blind hairpin to the left. Failure to negotiate this corner would be disastrous especially at high tide! One immediately is confronted by a narrow bridge across a stream followed by a hairpin to the right. It would require telepathy or some other diverse means to anticipate this death-trap as the Council has given no warning whatsoever. Even the centre-line is only dotted, not solid. (Incidentally, one might observe when crossing the narrow bridge between the two death-trap hairpins a notice in white paint on a rock straight ahead to vote a certain well known ex-councillor No. 1. I wonder what does he think?

A temporary measure for this spot would be an ordinary yellow road sign with the "snake" symbol on it, together with a solid white centre line; a more longterm solution is necessary for this scenic road that carries considerable tourist traffic in the summer-on whose custom this community depends. Remember to always anticipate that Spot however well you may know the road. There may be someone else who I for one nearly got caught out.
