Donal K. O'Boyle

The Donegal Person of the Year 1981 is Mr. Donal K. O'Boyle from Bunbeag, Gaoth Dobhair. At three months old Donal developed polio so from a tender age until he was seventeen he spent most of the time in and out of various hospitals in Dublin, Galway and Glasgow. It was after a series of operations in Glasgow at the age of fifteen that Donal took his "first steps". Although his left side is completely paralized he can now walk with the aid of a stick and sheer determination.

Due to his long periods in hospital Donal was unable to attend school except for a short period of eighteen months in National School where he was taught by his late father who had to carry him to and from the school. Donal is self educated and despite such setbacks he is now a member of the Institutes of Journalist, and contributes to newspapers and magazines both here and in Britain. For the past ten years he has covered the Eurovision. He has worked extremely hard helping to improve the facilities and services for his fellow handicapped and is fearlessly outspoken in demanding a better deal for them. He has carried out several national surveys of the handicapped in an effort to discover the areas of greatest need. He has been instrumental in locating many handicapped people in Co. Donegal who were totally unaware of their entitlements and many of these have been rehabilitated and are now in gainful employment.

He is Secretary of the North West Handicapped Committee and a few months ago was delighted to be presented with a coach from the Manchester United Supporters Club for the disabled to travel to work in North West Donegal He has also got ramps and wheelchairs, donated from the banks, in Ballrooms, Hotels, Football Grounds and other places of entertainment to ensure that the handicapped could gain access to these places. At the moment he is instrumental in trying to build a day centre for the handicapped in Dungloe and providing a sheltered workshop on the Gweedore Industrial Estate.

Two years ago the Mary from Dungloe Festival was almost at its end. Donal took up the task of keeping it going by giving advice to the young committee who found themselves in debt and he kept them together and it is still going, thanks to his efforts. He was also a great help to the Glenswilly Festival Committee, has helped to promote the Letterkenny International Folk Festival and has also advised the National Youth Development Organisation.





Donal is a tireless worker who doesn't take no for an answer and his achievements are many, despite his disability. He richly deserves to have this honour conferred on him. Comhgháirdeachas Donal.



Fife and Drum means not only music to the people of the Rosses it means also tradition. tradition started by the great Mullaghduff band in 1881 and which is as strong as ever today 100 years later.

Last year we saw the "new" Keadue travel to Belfast and go very near to winning the Ulster title. In recent years also we have seen a band from Rann na Feirste playing tunes with such professionalism that people forget about rain and hail listening to them ! Without I hope being over-critical, the Annagry band seem to lack that important quality fighting spirit. They seem to lose interest if they are not at the top. Perhaps they should take a leaf from Mullaghduff's book who put their teeth together and got on with it no matter how bad they were. In recent years the Mullaghduff bands' performances were poor to say the least but like soldiers they kept coming back and it is now only a matter of time until the victory songs echo around Mullaghduff - the home of fife music.

It was nice to see in recent years a channenge from the Derrybeg band in an effort to break the Rosses monopoly. It will however be hard to move those dedicated musicians from Keadue off the top. But rumour has it that Rann na Feirste will take bets that their music will land at least one of the major trophies come next year. Maybe just another cup will make it's way past the Crolly bridge to Derrybeg or to the spirited men of Mullaghduff. Sadly, unless Annagry concerto take their elbows off the counters they will again go home moaning about decisions.

Do the public have to wait until next year to see this confrontation arise ? Surely some committee could come up with the idea of running an indoor competition during the winter months. The facilities are there in places like Ostán na Rosann, Falcarragh Hall, Annagry College, St. Domenick's Glenties, with the latter I feel being the most suitable. If Fife & Drum bands can practice inside then surely they can compete there. So come on all you organisers, give us the first ever indoor competition in Donegal.

80 pages. Softback. Ir. £1.75.

As is obvious from the title the book has been issued to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of the best known co-operative in the north-west. It is an excellent means of commemorating this important milestone in the history of a venture which has gone from strength to strength.

The book is a hotchpotch. A collection of pieces which are interesting individually. A collection of photographs of the staff, some old pictures, addresses made at the jubilee celebrations and a gathering of historical material all add up to form a bizarre work. The book is reminiscent. It brings the "Cope" to mind. It has it's pieces higgledypiggledy throughout the Rosses like the material in the book.

It lets us know what state the "Cope" is in to-day. It is the biggest employer in the Rosses. It has lost much of it's agricultural base and has sought to serve the growing affluence of it's clientele. Let us hope that when the time comes to celebrate the centinary of the "Cope", a major work dealing with all aspects of the "Cope" will appear. While not wishing to take from the importance of the material on the "Cope" as it stands I think we must admit that Pádraig Ó Cnáimhsí's essay was the most enjoyable section. I used the word essay as his name appears with only one of the history pieces. I think that he is also responsible for the piece on the Templecrone Mill Book and also Snippets from early history. If it were he, it is rather a pity he was not given credit for his efforts. Anybody interested in the Rosses in the 20th. century should read Ó Cnáimhsí. He has a pleasant style and is absorbing reading.
