Food for thought - County Council ... This hazzard would not be so serious if our roads were like the new surface heading out of Dungloe towards Glenties.




If I write from the heart at random, Will my scribbling yield a theme. Will those seemingly empty verses, Form part of some greater scheme.



"The Old Puffer" - A look at the old Lough Swilly Railway by J. Carr, Jnr., Fálcarrach (Cuid a h-aon)

"Dear Mama, I'll be comin' home tomorrow, will you meet me at the train, Cos its good to touch the Green, Green, Grass of Home ..."

So Run the lines of a well-known C/W ballad and I was just thinking that those words may have been on many a young Donegal boy or girls lips as they returned home after six-month hard labour in the Lagan fields or when returning home from the picking of the Potatoe harvest in Scotland. (What some people today would call the "Good Old Days"). Returning to their beloved Donegal with their well earned few pounds and shillings. As I happen to reside not too far from what was once the Falcarragh Station, I decided to take a look back in history at the life and times of 'The Old Puffer' - a nick-name for the Old Lough Swilly Railway.

The beginning of the Railway - The first Public transport system in Donegal. The Derry-Letterkenny Rail line was completed and opened for traffic twenty years later - about 1883.

The Letterkenny-Burtonport line was authorised by the Letterkenny to Burtonport Extension Order of 1896 and in

1903 the railway blazed its way through the highways and the byways of Donegal to the fishing port of Burtonport on the Western Seaboard.

The Lough Swilly Railway Line was a narrow-gauge line throughout, and so, was the longest narrow-gauge line in the British Isles. For over half a century it grew, established itself and operated while the demand for a

railway service existed.

The opening of the railway in Donegal brought the wild rugged mountainsides to life. Yes, the noisy "Puffing Billy" awakened the sleepy countryside. At Stations, crowds gathered on the arrival of a train. only form of passenger and goods-transport there was. To the drivers it was a grand journey through the countryside when the weather was fine but, in the depth of winter and snow all around! ... Ah, sure they were great men those days! However, the railway served two world-wars and the "Troubles" that ended in the twenties.

Was it not our own dear St. Colmcille who prophecised that "a black pig would race from Derry to the Rosses"? And of course when the railway appeared, to many people Colmcille's prophecy had been fulfilled!
When the 'Old Puffer' was going up a hill the engine puffed and panted but, going down hill the engine was

smooth, thus, people used to say that going up-hill she seemed to be saying - "Will I make it, Will I make, Will I make it? And going down-hill it was - I made it, I made it!

The train worked on the power of steam until the end.

During the 1939 - 45 World War, the trains did a lot of smuggling! Sugar and butter, plentiful on this side of the border were carried 'North' while 'the North' sent us out tea and white bread. Many a good tale has been told of those by-gone days!

Services were suspended in 1940 when road transport for both passengers and goods began to appear on the roads. A temporary goods train for the haulage of turf was reinstated during the second World War from May 1941 to May 1946. During those years it cost the sum of One Pound and eight shillings to send a load of turf by train from

Falcarragh Station to Letterkenny Station.
The line eventually closed in January 1947 when the Lough Swilly Company established a replacement road service.

In 1863 the population of Donegal was 246,706. The population figures for 1929 stood at only 148,429. those sixty years Donegal had witnessed continual emigration as its people left their homes to seek employment beyond the borders of Donegal and much further afield either on a permanent or seasonal basis. Therefore the trains were operating with only a handful of passengers. The people who did stay at home in the North-West of Donegal were very upset at the lose of the railway. As one poet put it "Though I'm 50 years of age wheels and I'll engage, to take 40 times the load of any bus!" (Ar leanuint ar an mhí s'chugainn).



GAMES AT LETTERKENNY.

Perhaps the first organised attempt to bring team honours home to the Rosses was made at the Games held in Letterkenny, for the purpose of raising funds for St. Eunan's Cathedral.

At that time the late Father Dan Sweeney was curate in Kincasslagh, and well aware of the athletic prowess of his parishioners, he selected a Caman team and a Tug of War team from among the young men of the Lower Rosses, to take part in the competitions.

The Caman team included the following:—Charles McBride (Capt.), Gortnasate; Frank O'Donnell, Cruit Island (Goals): James Rodgers, Belcruit; Teague Ward, Meenbannid; Charles Boyle (Neil), Cruit Island; Hugh O'Donnell, Cruit Island; Samus O'Donnell, Kincasslagh,—all of whom are now deceased. The sole surviving member of the team, is Charles O'Donnell of Mullaghderg Mt., who at the time of writing is 81 years of age, and still hale and hearty.

The Tug of War team included the following:—Charles O'Donnell, Ballymanus; Charles Harley (Neil), Braade; Charles Harley (James), Braade; Mick Bonner, Arlands; Charles Bonner, Arlands; Anthony Gallagher, Glenahilt; Andrew Sharkey, Keadue; James O'Donnell, Ballymanus, The only one of the Tug of War team now alive, is John Boyle of Roshine.

It was certainly a big undertaking at that time to convey two teams from the Rosses to Letterkenny, a distance of 40 miles over bad roads. There was no train in those days, no motor cars, no buses—nothing only the horse drawn side car—but Father Dan Sweeney was undaunted, for he knew the worth of the Rosses men, and he wished for nothing better than to see them tested against the best in the County.

The day of the Games dawned, and Rosses people were early astir. The journey to Letterkenny via Glendowan, would take almost four hours, so that an early start had to be made. The skies were dark and sombre, as the members of the teams and supporters congregated at the meeting place in Kincasslagh. Then just before they set off on their long journey, the flood gates of the heavens opened, and the rain came down in torrents and it was in this deluge that the flower of the Rosses manhood set out to do battle for the honour of their parish. Thus began that nightmare journey over the bare, unsheltered roads of the Rosses, and the dark valleys of Glendowah.

The Caman team were the first to leave, as the competition in which they were engaged was first on the programme. Soaked to the skin and frozen to the marrow, after their long journey by side car, they arrived in Letterkenny just as the first game was due to commence.

The Rosses team had been drawn against Glenswilly. The men from the west did not ask for any postponement, in order to get dry clothing, but took the field immediately. The hardships they had suffered on their outward journey seemed only to add sparkle to their play, as they rammed home, goal after goal without reply against a Glenswilly team that was completely demoralized before the end. The final score was—Rosses—8 goals, Glenswilly—0.

Rosses now met Letterkenny in the final. It was early apparent in this game, that the Letterkenny team was to provide much stiffer opposition than Glenswilly, but the Rosses men, now scenting victory, were not to be denied, and in the end ran out easy winners by 7 goals to 3. Positional changes were made in this game. Charles McBride replaced Frank O'Donnell in goals, and the latter playing now in the forwards, put more bite into the attack. Very little can now be learned of the course of play in the final game. It can be reliably stated, however, that Hugh O'Donnell, of Cruit scored the first goal, booting the ball home as he lost his stick in a clash with an opponent. Seamus O'Donnell of Kincasslagh, though injured, played on to the end. Thus the Rosses Caman team had triumphed. The big question now was, would the Tug of War team emulate their deeds, and so make victory complete.




