Our gardens are not in very good shape just now after all the buffeting they took from the recent inclement weather, but a few good days of sunshine and a nice spring breeze can work wonders with the soils at this particular time of year.

Now is the time to pay attention to the roses, if they haven't already been pruned. New bushes just need to be cut right back to a good strong bud facing outwards. Keep the centre of the bush free from any lateral growth as this encourages pests and diseases. To combat these, spray at regular intervals with multirose, Main leaders of old established roses should be reduced by one third and any old or trotted wood out. A liberal dressing of any good fertiliser, followed by a mulch of well rotted farmyard manure should see them happy throughout the season.

Narcissi and tulips should be looking their best by now and in order to fill the

gap before the annuals make their debut why not plant Polyanthus Pansies and Sweet Williams which should give a good account of themselves until the end of May. Overcrowded herb plants should be divided up. Best way to do this is to take new shoots from the outside of the plant discounting the old root stock which has had its day.




Midnight Owl Video Club

The Story of the Keadue Band, 1888 - 1988

This interesting booklet was researched and compiled by Dr. Paddy Ferry. It has been produced to celebrate the band's centenary, to remember and honour the men who founded the band, to honour great achievements of Keadue and to have an accurate account of the first hundred years available when the history of 200 years of the Keadue Band is being written in 2088. The final reason appears to me to tempt the fate of the gods somewhat.

This type of work deserves a warm welcome for it records for this and future generations the labours and loves of ordinary individuals. The men who made up the core of the Keadue Band are not the source material for the history books. They lived mundane lives on the shore of the Rosses but their contribution to the fabric of the locality should and must be recorded. They are owed a great debt by those who have followed in their footsteps.

To have compiled a valuable social history such as this is evidence of extreme dedication on the author's part. His listing of the players, as many as was possible, is a source of joy and satisfaction to their descendants. As the book indicates, the Keadue band had its ups and downs, and yet it has lived for a hundred years in an area where there was little musical education outside the tuition provided by the Band instructors. It was a delight to read that the early musicians were capable of reading music. It casts aspertions on our education system at present that this art is not commonly available to children in both primary or post-primary schools. Every child should learn to read music at school.

It would appear as if the existence of band competitions is the inspiration for many of the current bands being. This is a pity as the primary function of the band is to provide musical entertainment. Too often, in rural areas, when good will and co-operation should be the theme of life we find energies being devoted to various forms of local competition. It was obvious that the early players were devoted to their craft. The modern player may be as devoted but as an observer it appears to us that much of the current dedication to band music is based on local rivalry.

May the band have as glorious a future as it has had of a past. May the future generations display as fine a sense of musicianship and may they entertain and delight people for years to come. The author has worked hard to produce this book and it will be treasured for its vastness of information and clarity of style. There was a minor point at the beginning of the book which niggled us - what is the point of the author telling us at the end of his introduction that he is an honour graduate in Dentistry from the National University of Ireland? Perhaps it has a bearing on this book which we failed to observe?

Dinny on the Railway...

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I found you article on the West Donegal Railway most interesting. It illustrates the tremendous contribution of the railway to business, commerce and travel in Donegal. The decision to phase out and eventually close down the railway in the mid-1940's can certainly be questioned, particularly now with the benefit of hindsight. At present, we must be one of the few counties in Ireland without the benefit of a rail line. Nowadays rail travel is becoming popular again and is being promoted as tourist attractions in many areas throughout Europe. I do know of several areas in the country that are contemplating reopening disused lines. I understand that the Mayo Development team have applied to the E.E.C. for funding to study restoration and development of the Claremorris to Colooney railway line.

When one considers the remoteness of Donegal from other parts of the Republic, the condition of roads within the county, particularly to the West, the advantages of a railway line become obvious. Whether it is economically possible and viable to do this requires much research and study.




Windsurfing

SATELLITE TELEVISION **IS HERE!**

After two and a half years of waiting due to technical problems, the powerful Ariane Rocket finally blasted off on the 11th of December 1988 from French Guyana, loaded with the new Astra television satellite on board, destination, 22,000 miles high, 19 degrees east.

Astra is Europe's new television satellite. It combines the latest space and communications technology, and was switched on in late February, and is now bringing to the viewer a much greater choice of T.V. entertainment from all over the world.

Television viewing need no longer be limited to our regular channels. This new satellite will change everything, it will offer a much wider choice of viewing with eight channels in addition to the six we already have, bringing the total to fourteen, with a further eight more at the end of the year, aimed mainly at Europe. The following channels are

now on air:

EUROSPORT: covering football, athletics, golf, tennis, skiing, motor sport etc

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SKY CHANNEL: General entertainment around the clock

SKY NEWS: 24 hour news from U.K., Ireland and around the world SKY MOVIES: Showing over 300

films per year LIFE STYLE: Womens' Interests fashion, cookery, keep fit, chat shows, films, documentaries etc. Screen Sport: Covering major sports events

LANDSCAPE CHANNEL: For the outdoor person SKY ARTS CHANNEL: For the cla-

sically inclined, with a complete new way of presenting art and culture

DISNEY CHANNEL: For children. To be opened soon.

Most of the channels will be freely available with the exception of about two which will be coded, they can also be received with a decoder which can be purchased at an extra cost.

The equipment needed to receive the new channels consists of a small receiving dish approx. 2-2.5 feet in diameter, and can be mounted in the garden, on the wall, or chimney connected to a control box attached to a normal colour T.V. set, bringing in crystal clear pictures.

The cost of a complete installation would vary between £390 . £470, depending on the type of equipment used.


A very modest price to pay for such a choice of programmes in comparison to a few years ago, when the cost was over £2,000,.

The new transmission can be picked up on a standard eight button tuner colour T.V., using the new equipment, if the T.V. has teletext incorporated, Skytext can also be received, giving access to further information.

Satellite programmes can be recorded on video while watching another local ground station.

This new system will be particularly welcome where only the two National channels RTE 1 and 2 are being received.

WOMAN'S WORLD **Orange And Pepper Stuffed Plaice**

Ingredients: 4 Plaice Fillets Salt and pepper

Stuffing: 1 Green pepper (Cored, seeded and chopped) 2 ozs fresh breadcrumbs Grated rind & juice of 1 orange

To Garnish: Green Pepper rings Orange slices

Method:

1. Sking the plaice fillets, sprinkle with salt and pepper and place on a flat surface.

2. Mix together the green pepper, breadcrumbs and half the orange rind. Season to taste and bind with a little orange juice.

3. Divide the stuffing between the fillets, roll up and secure each with a cocktail stick.

4. Place in a shallow ovenproof dish and sprinkle with the remaining orange rind, salt and pepper.

5. Pour the rest of the orange juice over the fish and cook in a pre-heated moderate oven - 180°c: 350°c: Gas 4. for 30 minutes or until fish is tender. 6. Remove the cocktail sticks and serve garnished with green pepper rings and orange slices.

Serves 4 Calories per portion: 130

Quick Tip: To skin the fish: Hold the fish by the tail. Skin from tail to head with quick short strokes. Keep the edge of the blade (very sharp) close to the surface of the skin so that no fish is wasted.






