


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BIG BROTHER IS WATCHINGYOU!

The recent ammunition finds in County Donegal did not surprise those of us in the know in Dublin. It has been known for some time that British Army Air Corp pilots have been flying inside the Republic and taking photographs - with the Irish Government's permission, no less. The pilots were made aware that they were allowed to fly as far as five miles from this side of the border if an order was received from an Army chief. It is known however, that the ambitious photographers are flying further south than is being permitted. The "Lynx" helicopters and "Beaver" planes that are being used for THESE CROSSBORDER EXCURSIONS are fitted with infra-red equipment to enable them to take photographs. The data being collected is sent to Dublin and as a result there has been an increase in arms searches in border areas.

People living in border areas are now beginning to get worried about the possibility of an IRA attack on one of the helicopters. The Authorities on both sides of the border claim that these excursions happen by accident and they deny that there is any agreement regarding the crossborder surveillance.


Anyway, the next time you see a suspiciouslooking flying object, make sure the camera catches the best side of your face!



For the rest of the week.



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

GROUP'S CONCERN

The Letterkenny Amnesty Group wants to create awareness of the extent of human rights violations in Turkey, a country which is currently being promoted as a popular holiday destination for Irish tourists.

At their recent meeting, the Group expressed grave concern about the violation of human rights in Turkey. The research of Amnesty International consistently shows evidence of abuse of human rights on a wide scale. Amnesty has received increasing reports of widespread use of torture, detention without charge, unfair trials and death in custody.

Since 1980, over two hundred men and women have died in custody in Turkish prisons, and the Turkish authorities have provided no explanation whatsoever for one hundred and forty-four of these deaths.

Amnesty International charges that the Turkish Government has failed to eliminate the routine torture of political prisoners, and continues to deny basic human rights.

A DONEGALMAN IN DUBLIN

"The Leader" is still alive! I must admit that, being the pessimistic person that I am, I never thought it would survive. When I was the Editor for the first couple of editions, although pretending to be confident, I was almost certain it would be a total failure. Obviously it wasn't and the people of the area have been loyal disciples to "The Leader". I was saddened to leave the paper but other duties had to be attended to in Dublin.

The present Editor seems to have hit upon the formula which sells a community magazine. It appeals to young and old or as he put it himself, "people from eight to eighty". Nevertheless, I feel that there is a lot missing from "the Leader". Has it succeeded in becoming the voice of the people, which was one of the main aims at the start. I think not!

I believe that Donegal needs a magazine which would analise local news and current affairs in a way which the

weekly papers don't. Plenty of photographs, small features and gossip are alright, but the public want more. Perhaps there is a market for another magazine? When I was with "the Leader", I found myself torn between publishing what I wanted to read, and what I thought the public wanted to read. Most of the time, I ended up publishing snippets and short features, which would bring on a sudden bout of vomiting. What I wanted at the time was a Magill/ Phoenix/ New Nation/ Guth agus Tuairim all rolled into one type of magazine, with all the articles based on the county. It was probably an impossible thing to do, and I would more than likely end up being the only reader.

I hope I haven't sounded too harsh on the paper, or its publishers, and that "the Leader" will continue to grow. There is a need for a local magazine and I'll be very interested to see how it develops in

the future.



"Who the hell is this prisoner, Jose Rodriguez?"

"He's just an illiterate peasant, Sir".

"He can't be, you idiot! This guy has thousands of friends all over the world who keep writing to me asking for his release".

In our January edition, we carried a brief report on Amnesty International. Here now is a more detailed look at this unique worldwide human rights movement.

A South American journalist was hanging naked by his knees from an iron bar in the torture cell of a prison in Brazil. His wrists and ankles were tied together, while an electric current was intermittently run through his body. During a short break in the torture, he asked his "interrogators" why they were doing this to him.

"Because", they replied, "you write articles saying that in Brazil we torture people, and you know that is not true". The journalist's laugh, as he realised that he finally understood the true meaning of absurd, was cut short as the current was switched on again. This incident was told in a recent report from Brazil by an official of Amnesty International.

On Trinity Sunday last May, the bells of St. Clement Dane's church in London's Strand rang out 5000 times. Each peal represented the 5,000 prisoners of conscience throughout the world for whose release Amnesty International is campaigning at any time. But the bells were also tolling to celebrate Amnesty's 25th birthday.

In late 1960 Peter Benenson, an English Catholic lawyer, read a newspaper report about two Portuguese students who were arrested in a Lisbon restaurant and sentenced to 7 years imprisonment for raising their glasses in a toast to freedom. His first reaction was to go to the Portuguese embassy in London and protest; but he realised that such an individual gesture would achieve little for the students themselves.

Ruthless repression of dissent by many governments throughout the world was a problem that had long worried Peter Benenson. During the 1950s, he had attended political trials in Hungary, Cyprus, South Africa and Spain, either as a legal observer of as a defence counsel. He had also written and broadcast widely about the problem.

Now he began to wonder how oppressive regimes might react to concerted worldwide protests at acts of political injustice, rather than to the individual protest he had contemplated in the case of the two Portuguese students. Gradually he conceived the ideal of a one-year international campaign to draw world attention to the plight of people detained under all sorts of political systems for the peaceful oppression of their political or religious opinions.

He discussed the idea with Eric Baker, a prominent English Quaker, and other friends. Their enthusiastic reactions led him to write an article entitled The Forgotten Prisoners to The Observer newspaper. His article and a report in the

Paris paper Le Monde the same day announced the launching of a one-year campaign called Appeal for Amnesty 1961. Its aim was to obtain an amnesty for all political and religious prisoners of conscience. Part of the campaign was to establish an office in London for collecting information about such prisoners and publicizing individual cases.

Peter Benenson, a devout Catholic, deliberately chose Trinity Sunday 1961 for launching Amnesty International. He did so, he said, because the liberation of the spirit is at the heart of Christian belief and because there are three worlds of making to be united in humanity. He proposed a threes network: each group of Amnesty supporters would adopt three prisoners and work for their release. One would be from a Communist country, one from the capitalist West and the third from the Third World.

In his article The Forgotten Prisoners, Peter Benenson drew attention to the fact that a century after the abolition of slavery, man had found new ways of degrading man, that all over the world, in countries of every political persuasion, governments were imprisoning people because of their beliefs, while torture and executions were also widespread. He put forward the simple idea that these prisoners could be helped; first get the facts about abuses of human rights and then use them to mobilize public opinion so as to persuade governments to release prisoners of conscience - as well as to abolish torture and the death penalty.

The reaction was overwhelming. Within a month, more than 1000 offers of help were received together with a great amount of information about thousands of prisoners of conscience. The week after Amnesty was founded in London, an Irish section was set up by Sean McBride. Soon the campaign grew into a worldwide movement. The first international meeting was held 3 months later, and Sean McBride became chairman of the International Executive.

Amnesty International now has more than 500,000 members and subscribers in over 150 countries. It is independent of all governments, economic interests and political or religious groups. Its specific role in the protection of human rights focuses on the release of prisoners of conscience - men and women imprisoned for their beliefs, colour, ethnic origin or religion, who have not used or advocated violence; it works for fair and prompt trials for all political prisoners and on behalf of such people detained without charge or trial; and it opposes the death penalty and torture or other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment of all prisoners. Its work is based on the principles set forth in the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Amnesty attaches great importance to accurate and impartial reporting of facts. Its research de-

partment collects and analyses information from a wide variety of sources - hundreds of newspapers, transcripts or radio broadcasts and reports from lawyers and humanitarian organisations. It gets information too from prisoners and their families, refugee centres, religious groups and other people with first hand experience. It also sends fact-finding missions for on-the-spot investigations and to observe trials, meet prisoners and interview government officials.

The techniques it uses include long-term adoption of individual cases; campaigns on particular countries or human rights abuses; mobilizing professional occupational groups on behalf of colleagues; and, in cases where torture or death are feared, organising a network of volunteers to send urgent telegrams signalling international concern.

Letter writing is one of Amnesty's most important ways of working for prisoners. From the simple idea that ordinary people could, by letter writing, persuade governments to release prisoners of conscience, has grown a worldwide movement of over 500,000 people. When Amnesty began, people said that individuals could hot hope to sway the minds of governments. But it has shown clearly that the free individual can do something to reduce the abuses of state power. Today, many governments simply have to take note of what Amnesty says and does.

The death penalty is still in force in 130 countries. Last year, 1489 prisoners were sentenced to death in 61 countries and 1125 of them in 44 countries were executed. These included 137 in South Africa, 135 in China, 57 in Pakistan, 45 in Saudh Arabia and 18 in the United States. The number waiting on Death Row in the US reached 1600 last year and is still increasing. During the year, Amnesty members wrote appeals for 68 prisoners under sentence to death.

Last year, 4562 prisoners were either adopted as prisoners of conscience or investigated as such by Amnesty, and it reported detention without trial of political detainees in 50 countries. It stated the torture is still being used in one-third of the world's countries. Since it began, Amnesty has adopted the cases for more than 30,000 prisoners.

In future editions of "The Leader", we intend to feature the cases of some of Amnesty's "prisoners of conscience" and hope that our readers will join the Letterwriting campaign on their behalf. 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

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



THE STORY OF THE LA SCALA BIG BAND-

Part Two by John O'Dwyer

At the start, none of the band had day jobs, except Padraig who was a hackney driver and they all lived off the music. The La Scala charged 8 Guineas a night in the beginning, later going up to 10 Guineas. Cathal Murray remembers one dance-hall owner who used to pack 400 to 500 into his hall. At the end of the night, he'd come to Padraig who looked after the band's finances, and he'd count out ten pounds and Padraig always had to remind him that the fee was ten Guineas. He'd have it in his back pocket all the time, and he'd hand it over and say "there, that's my profit all gone"! "This particular character was once let down by a band from Derry", says Cathal, "so he'd be so nervous come dance night we'd meet him two miles out the road and give him a lift in. But he'd always give you a good meal in the middle of the night, no matter what !".

During Lent of course, everything came to standstill, apart from the odd night in Maggie Neill's.

In those days, there were no fancy buses and the means of transport for a band were the huge big cars of the day. Cathal fondly remembers and old Chevy. registration number IU 9877, but their usual transport was a Ford Custom Line with a big V8 engine. They got special springs made for in in Bishopsgate in Derry - to carry up to 10 band members and all their kit. "We'd all just pack in", says Cathal, "and you'd get pins and needles between here and Mayo, so we'd have to stop to stretch the legs a couple of times. At one stage during the 50s, the Gweebarra bridge went down, and the band had to walk across the river with their instruments where they were picked up on the other side by McHugh's taxis from Clooney and taken to the dance.

The popular numbers in those days were "Henry Lee", "Fraulein", "Zambezi", "Sail Along Silvery Moon", "Saxaphobic", and the most requested song was "Oh Mine Papa". Another popular one was "Buttons and Bows", which was Margaret Murray's first song on stage.

The first number was always a quick step, followed by an Old Tyme Waltz, and a foxtrot. There'd be two "mixed-grills" in the night, consisting of a quick-step, tango, samba, rumba, barndance, highland, donkey, one part Siege of Venice and finished off with a quick step. There'd also be a full three part tango in the night. And of course there were the "ladies' choices", and the men would always be coming up asking for Ladies' Choices to be played. Also popular were Ladies and Gents "Excuse Me" dances where you tapped your desired partner on the shoulder.

A lot of the halls were run by the clergy in those days and strict rules were enforced. It was not uncommon for a lassie to be marched out of the hall in front of everyone for talking to, or getting friendly with a member of the band. Alcohol was frowned upon, but even so some men usually turned up more than a little intoxicated, and if they got into the hall, it wouldn't take much to start a good scrap - perhaps a request read out by the band (which may have looked innocent enough). Of course, the few drinks were handy to drum up the courage to cross the floor because the girls stood on one side of the hall and the men on the other side. and it took a lot of nerve to cross that floor to ask a girl to dance. The trouble was, she might refuse and you'd have to walk back again! In some places a very elaborate sign language developed and a nod might do the trick or even sticking out a shoe when asking a lady out to dance.

Money was scarce, and hall owners would tell you about different tricks that used to be played - like medals appearing with the top filed off them, and shilling hammered flat to make them look like two shilling pieces. Cathal remembers Sadler's Iona Hall in Ardara was 1/9 admission on a Sunday night. They put it up to two shillings and the following Sunday night hardly anyone turned up. Padraig said to the owner "you better go back to 1/9 next Sunday or you'll have to close". Sadler wouldn't agree. "They'll be back !", he said. And so they were. From then on, the dances would go up 6d, maybe, and nobody would question it.

But the 60s brought the end to an era. The music changed. Along came the Beatles, the Mersey sound and the Rolling Stones. "The Beatles put a tin hat on it", reflects Cathal. "Guitars came on the scene and finished the brass". The showbands made a dramatic appearance on the Irish music scene. Very soon, the Lounge Bars also appeared - and social life in Ireland was never going to be the same again. The La Scala weren't interested in changing the music and so they went their separate ways with some of the members joining other bands. But such was their appeal that they never really hung up their instruments. People kept asking them to play at Charity dances and other fund-raising functions and they have been doing that until this day. Indeed over the years, the La Scala have helped to collect upwards of £25,000 for charity.

They have brought joy to thousands of people down through the years with their distinctive sound. Long may their music continue!

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



St. Patrick's Day Trifle

Sponge Sandwich:

20zs/50g Ranks Flour, self-raising Pinch of Salt 20zs/50g Caster sugar 2 Eggs

Trifle:

2-3 tbsps. Sherry, optional 1 packet Greenagage Jelly 1 Med.tin Peaches or apricots 1/2 pint Thick custard 1/2 pint Fresh cream

Method:

1. Make up sponge base (in advance of making trifle). Whisk the eggs and sugar together until thick and creamy. Sieve flour and salt and very gently fold in using a tablespoon. Place in a greased and floured 8"/20cm sandwich tin and bake towards the top of the oven, 400°F, 200°C, Gas Mark 6, for about 15 mins, or until golden. Allow to cool on a wire tray.

Crumble sponge into glass serving bowl. Sprinkle on the sherry if used.

3. Open tin of fruit and drain off juice. Measure juice and for jelly make up to required quantity with water (as per packet instructions). When dissolved, pour over sponge and allow to set.

4. Arrange the fruit over jelly. Make up the custard to fairly thick consistency, then pour over

Ingredients:

For the Scone Base:

8ozs self-raising wholemeal flour 1 teaspoon mixed herbs 1/2 teaspoon salt, black pepper 5 tablespoons (approx.) oil

For the Topping:

4 (drained) anchovy fillets
1oz (drained) capers
2ozs (") tuna fish
6ozs grated red cheddar cheese
2 medium tomatoes

fruit. When custard has cooled, whip the cream and pipe over top.

5. Sugar Decoration - place 2 teaspoons granulated sugar in a cup. Add a tiny drop of green colouring and stir, with a fork. Just before serving the trifle, spinkle the sugar over cream.

N.B. If this is done in advance the colour will "run" into cream.





FRYING PAN PIZZA (Serves 4)

Method for Pizza Base:

- 1) Combine flour herbs, salt & pepper in a bowl 2) Make a well in centre & spoon in 2 tablespoons
- of oil, followed by 5-7 tablesp. water
- 3) Stir to form soft but not sticky dough

4) Turn out onto a floured board, knead then roll out to a round bit enough to fit the base of a 9-10 inch frying pan

5) Heat the pan then add a tablespoon of oil. Lay the dough on the pan and cook over low heat for 5-8 minutes until base is golden

6) While this is cooking, put anchovies, capers and tuna into the blender and process to a smooth paste. Drip in 2 tablespoons of oil and incorporate with paste.

7) When the pizza base is brown, invert the pan on to a large plate, add another tablespoon of oil to the pan and slip the dough back on to cook the other side for further 5-8 minutes or until golden.

8) Spread the tuna mixture on the cooked surface and arrange the sliced tomatoes on top (pre-heat the grill now)

9) When the underside of the pizza is cooked, transfer the lot to finish under the grill

10) Cook the tomatoes for 3 mins approx. and then scatter the pepper strips over the top, finishing by scattering the grated cheese. Grill until the cheese has melted, then serve

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
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THE VOCATION AND MISSION OF THE LAITY

POPE JOHN II - Veritas, 196 pgs. Paperback - £3.95

At the conclusion of the 1987 Synod of Bishops those present made known to the Pope their desires and requested that at an opportune time, a conclusive papal document on the topic of the lay faithful be offered to the Universal Church.

In writing the tract on the vocation and mission of the lay faithful in the Church and in the world, the Pope intended to stir and promote a deeper awareness among all the faithful of the gift and responsibility they share, both as a group and as individuals, in the communion and mission of the Church. The document says that it is not permissible for anyone to remain idle on the threshold of the Third Millennium. A new state of affairs today both in the Church and in social, economic, political and cultural life, calls with a particular urgency for the action of the lay faithful. The lay faithful may be described as those who have been baptised and are not in Holy Orders. The lay faithful are exhorted to participate in the threefold - priest, prophet/teacher, king/mission of Christ. The lay faithful have the vocation and mission of proclaiming the Gospel.

This document is putting a greater emphasis, if we have read it correctly, on the power of the laity in the Church today and also on their capacity for work. The laity seem to have a larger role than was obvious. They are seen as a force which will turn the tide of secularism through their living a Christian life; they are the

labourers in the vineyard.
