# Swimming Pool to be Renovated in October

ork starts in October on the renovation of the Letterkenny Swimming Pool, which has been closed since March 1987. The urban District Council are considering tenders at the moment and the contractor should be named within a fortnight. The news will be welcomed by the many

swimmers in the county who have had to travel to Derry and Strabane since the local pool was damaged.

Many people who cannot afford the journey to the North have been left without any swimming facilities since March of last year. One person who was a frequent swimmer at the Letterkenny pool told the LEADER "It's about time they done something - I haven't been bloody swimming for ages!"

Local contractors are keeping their fingers crossed at the moment in the hope that they will get the lucrative contract to renovate the pool. The LEADER can reveal that a Galway firm, Ryan Hanley Consulting Engineers, made out the plans for the Letterkenny Swimming Pool Improvement Scheme.

No hints have been given as to when the swimming pool would be re-opened.

# ANTI-LOCALS ON COUNCIL COMMITTEE

#### WATCHDOG ROLE FOR LOCAL AIRPORT COMMITTEE

he Letterkenny Airport Committee have decided to adopt a watchdog role as regards the building of an airport in Letterkenny. "We're going to shout if things aren't going the way they should", said a spokes-

man. This comes following the setting up of a County Council sub committee on the airport which will include one representative from the local Airport Committee.

The Letterkenny Association feels that the local Airport Committee should have a stronger reprentation on the County Council Airport Committee. The Association's chairman, Joe Gallagher, told the LEADER: "Eamonn Harkin and the committee are the pioneers of the airport, I would hope that the local people would be properly represented on the committee that is now being formed". The Letterkenny Airport Committee chairman, A.D. Kelly, however, told the LEADER that they were very happy. "If other people want to do the work, that's alright".

#### ANTI-LOCAL

Mr. Kelly told the LEADER that he feels there is one or a few within the Council who are "not pro the local Airport Group". We understand that a Fianna Fail Councillor has been appointed Chairman of the Council Airport Committee. The Council Committee will meet on Monday 29th of this month to discuss their plans and strategy.

There is the feeling locally among a lot of people that the Letter-kenny Airport Committee, a group of seventeen who have been working together for twenty-five years, have been blown cold. They will come together before the Council's meeting on the 29th to discuss their future plans. "We don't want a Mickey Mouse job", Mr. Kelly told the LEADER.

It seems likely now that the present Government may sanction an airport for Letterkenny. The County Council own the site on the Big Isle near Manorcunningham, which is to used for the building of the airport when it's given the go-ahead.

# ETTERKENN ITS DHENOMINA

Donegal hoteliers, hoping for a bumper season this summer, confess to considerable disap pointment that things have not worked out as hoped for. Great store is placed on the presence at this time of year on American tour-ists. They used to come in shoals; this year they seem to be a noticeable minority of the patrons of our

hotels, in town and country alike.

Dollar problems, causing an unfavourable exchange rate, could be one of the reasons; Americans like full value for the money they spend. They expect the best in food and accomodation and are prepared to pay the price of total satisfaction. To lose this valuable source of revenue can be a severe reverse for those in the catering business, and who count, with the advent of summer, on large influxes of visitors from

the New World.

They come here mainly, would say, because of the "Irish connection". They have an obses-sion with uncovering their "roots". They will go to any trouble or expense to catch even a fleeting glimpse of that old homestead, or what may remain of it, where their forebears were born. Such nostalgic discoveries can be of intense interest, setting in train a full investigation into ancestry and family history. Pictures are taken, elderly citizens queried for any avail-able information on members of the stock still surviving. It all goes into the notebooks and adds brances, however small, to the family "tree"

#### HIVE OF ACTIVITY

Most of these touring Americans make a point of including Donegal in their itinerary, and while "discoveries" may seem trivial to the outsider, they are treasured, dissected and discussed with avidity when they arrive back home.

Coming to the Letterkenny area they work up a strong apetite for local history; the town, after all, has a storied past. They are made aware of the connection of Sentry Hill and Rodger's Burn with the grim era of the Mass Rocks when religious persecution was linked to the horrors of the Famine. They marvel at latterday developments in business, commerce, housing and the amenities that go hand in hand with urban expansion. They note the changes that have taken place since their earliest visits, and in some cases, since they were boys at the Brothers' and Convent schools. With a steadily mounting

population and a plethora of housing estates, hastily developed to cope with increasing demands, they note the one-time rather backward, rather static community is a hive of progressive activity, all adding to the toll of wealth that is reflected in a measure of prosperity unknown in the "old

It's a truism that progress or retrogression in any town can be measured by the attitude of its people to civic development. Letterkenny's advances along many fronts is the chief pointer to the insistence of the community that Letterkenny must prove itself to be the capital of Donegal in many more ways than one.

All sections merge when anything is proposed for urban development. Workers spring immediately into action, a friendly rivalry is engendered to win the maximum in achievement. In this role the womenfolk play a leading, indeed an essential role. They se high targets and achieve then There is no time for half measures Having won a favourable "image", they are bent on going any other possible step further. Community cohesion was never at a higher

There are, of course, continuing problems, and these are being wrestled with, for the most part successfully. Setbacks are part successfully. Setbacks are deemed to be incentives to maintain the pressure. The local authority does its best across a broad front, and while progress may seem slow, there are advances of great significance and value.

It's a far cry from the days when amenities like housing were an annoying rarity, when countless families were deprived of decent home. That has all changed. Today, Letterkenny is awash with well-organised housing estates and private building was never busier. Everybody and every line of commercial and industrial activity wants to get a foot in the town. Sites are getting alarmingly scarce, and costly. Are we reaching the point of over-supply? It could happen.

All in all, a pleasant story, with vistas for the future never looking more promising. All credit then to those at county and local level, whose shoulder the daunting burden of urban progression. They are doing a very good job...and they have the civic-minded citizenry behind them.

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# Combined Charities Cycle Galway-Letterkenny



Three well-known charities - Concern, Friends of St. Lukes and Raphoe Mission to Peru, are joining forces to run a sponsored cycle from Galway to Letterkenny on Sept 3rd and 4th.

Concern mainly work in bringing relief to areas of famine and natural disasters in the Third World. Friends of St. Lukes endeavour to prove facilities at St. Lukes Hospital in Dublin, which 1,700 Donegal people

The 160 mile 2-day cycle will leave Galway on Saturday morning, 3rd September, and after spending Saturday night in Sligo, will reach Letterkenny on Sunday evening, the 4th. So far, over 75 willing people have committed themselves to taking part, including two sets of married couples and a grandmother.

# THE CATHERINE CARBRERY INTERVIEW



Catherine Carbrery, (McCormack before marriage) was born in Gleann Domhain near Churchill. Catherine has worked hard all her life, having worked in America for years. She is now 91 years old and has lived in Letterkenny since 1944. This is an ordinary woman's story; Catherine isn't famous, but what she has to say deserves to be heard. Catherine talked to Ronan McCormaic about her life.

# RMC: What language did you speak at home?

CATH: It was all Irish we spoke at home. It was all Irish my father and mother spoke. We learned English then when we went to school.

(This interview was conducted through Irish)

# Did your husband have Irish?

He didn't. He was from Letterkenny. He went to the Brothers his mother had a bit of Irish. It was all Irish I had. Baisteadh mise insa teagasc criostai i ngaelic. Gaelic uilig a bhi againn i gconai.

#### When were you born?

I was born on the 15th of April 1897.

# You're looking well for your age.

Ah, that's what everybody says (roiste mor gaire). I'm a bit stiff now... but I'm able to move around, make the tea and that.

# I believe you spent some time in America?

I left for America in 1914 when I was seventeen years old. My father left me up in Derry where I got the boat for New York. I met my sisters Nellie and Fanny McCormack in Philadelphia. I got work with a relation of my sister's employer. I didn't like the big town. I remember in my first job, that was doing everything - cook, chambermaid, everything. I got on well. I was two years there in a house, and then I moved to another house in the country owned by the same people. There was girl from Termon working alongside me, and she came home the time we came home as well.

### How long did you spend there?

I was six years there the first time. Then I came home and staved about a year. We went back and we were only there 3 months when my father died in August. He is sixty years dead this month. We stayed away four years and they came back because one of my sisters was marrying. Fanny married and stayed there. We went back then and stayed another six years. You'd be a week travelling across. There was a mass on the boat on Sunday and it was very nice; y'know, having a mass in the middle of the sea. We came back then for my other sister's marriage. I stayed in Churchill and a year later I married.

# Were you all married to Irishmen?

Oh definately, we all married Irishmen in Ireland. We met them at home. We didn't go near the American men. My husband was born in Letterkenny, but he went out to Gleann Domhain, where he stayed for a while, and it was there that I met him. He was a cobbler, he had a shop where Clarkes Newsagents is now. We've been here for forty-four years, since 1944. He is eight years dead now.

#### Do you every get lonely?

No, I'm never lonely, thank God and the Virgin Mary. I can go to sleep. My sister's daughter comes in to make the tea for me. I have one sister, Biddy, who is living in Gleann Domhain. She's younger than me, she's 82, nine years younger than me.

#### Was it a big family?

Nine. Five girls and four boys. They're all dead now except for myself and Biddy. They're all out in Dughlaesigh Graveyard near Churchill. Did you not hear the song about it: "Back in Dughlaisi

once again, near Gartan's lovely Bav".

# Do you have any memories of the Troubles?

Ah, I was away when they were fighting. I do not remember any of it. De Valera visited America in those days and I met him there. We welcomed him when he came. He was a great man.

# Do you remember the Black and Tans?

They raided our house in Gleane Domhain. A lot of the old IR members on the run would stay in our house. They took one of my brothers to prison following one raid. I was in America at the time. The Black and Tans were devils. One man was hiding at the bott of our lane, and he was caus. They sent him to Dartmoor prison for four years. Our house was very Republican.

# What do you think of the present IRA?

I don't think much of them. They aren't like the old boys. I support Charlie Haughey.

# Where was the first place you ever worked?

I used in work in Termon during the Spring for 6 months. I was fourteen years old at the time. I earned five pounds for the 6 months work. When I went to America I was earning 8 Dollars a week. America was a big char from running after cattle.

# Would you like to go back to America?

I would, I have a cousin over there, .but I wouldn't go up in a plane. If there was a boat going, I would go in the morning.

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
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

#### **STRAWBERRY CHEESECAKE**

8oz Cottage Cheese 1 carton natural yoghurt 1/4 pt cream 1/2 strawberry jelly 4oz strawber-

Base: 4oz biscuit crumbs 2g but-

Method: 1. Melt butter in saucepan and blend in biscuit crumbs 2 Press mixture into loose-based sandwich tin with back of spoon and leave to harden in fridge. 3. Dissolve jelly in smallest amount of boiling water (1p2 tablespoons) and allow to cool. 4. Sive the cottage cheese into a mixing bowl and add yoghurt. 5. Whip cream until it stands in soft heaps. Fold the cream, cooled jelly and most of strawberries into cheese and yoghurt mixture. 6. Pour over the biscuit base in tin, and allow to set. When set (2hrs) decorate with strawberries. This cheesecake can be made with flavour or jelly if you wish.

#### **BEAUTY HINTS** Dry Skin

How to recognise:

1. Skin feels tight, not firm but taut, especially after being outdoors or in a dry atmosphere.

2. Skin may flake. Extremely dry skin can lose its top layer.

3. Skin tends to look dull and can have a chappy appearance.

4. Skin is more prone to lines and crow's feet.

5. Skin is sensitive, and prone to broken veins. These range from occasional tiny broken capillaries looking like minute stripes of red lightening - to vividly rosy cheeks which are a mass of broken veins. The veins lie just beneath the surface of the skin, and the rupturing is often caused by extremes of temperatures or weather, hot water, a blow or heavy pressure, such as trying to squeese a spot; of by eating very heavily spiced of hot foods, or drinking alcohol. All these cause blood to flush to the surface of the skin where it then cools quickly.

Where most common?





# SPOTLIGHT ON MICHAEL OG HANLON

Everybody throughout the length and breadth of Ireland and beyond knows Michael Og Hanlon. He is Mr. "Mary from Dungloe" Festival.

Michael is a permanent fixture on the Main street of Dunbloe.

And if you happen to come to town and don't see him, then something must be wrong!

I wonder how many of you are aware that Michael was born in Falcarragh! Not long after Michael's birth, the family moved to Quay Road, Dungloe. Michael's parents were called Grace and Michael. As well as Michael (Junior), there were two other boys in the family, John and Joe. Joe died in Dungloe when he was only 14, and John died in England without reaching his 50th birthday. With both parents also dead, Michael is the last surviving member of his family.

For many years, Michael joined the hordes of migrant seasonal farm workers, mainly from the North-West, who were employed in Scotland during the potatoe harvest. These workers of course were called "tatie hokers". Indeed, this writer can well remember the "tatie workers" of old board their minibus on the Main St. and head for Scotland. Michael Og Hanlon was one of those. But, like so many, maybe all of our emigrants, he longed to return home one day and settle down on a permanent basis.

This he did in 1968. No sooner was he home than he settled down to giving Dungloe and the community at large all the service he could. His dynamic personality earned him many friends and much respect. The "Mary from Dungloe" Festival was just beginning. Michael became a committee member and has been an ever-present on the committee ever since. He is a tireless worker who gives his all and puts everything into whatever project he

may be associated with. He sells tickets for the "Mary from Dungloe" Festival Committee outside the Cope, day in day out, and does so humbly and patiently, such is the nature of this wonderful man. And, as someone asked during the Festival, who else would do it?

Come hail, rain or shine, Michael will also be seen collecting the money at the field for Dungloe GAA Club. But the greatest work of all that he does is for charity. Whatever the cause, Michael is willing to help. He can never be repaid fully for all that he has done for charity. It is little wonder that he was presented recently with a framed certificate from the Irish Guide

Dogs Association. It was a simple token of gratitude Michael was so pleased to receive it, but it was no more than he would have asked for. Michael is not in the business of receiving - he is in the business of giving.

And he has given more than his share to this community over the past 20 years. In recognition of the work he has done for the Festival, he was presented with a Cavan Irish Crystal Handmade Clock by Guinness at the crowning cabaret. He also received 600 cigarettes from Carrolls.

He says he loves Dungloe and its people and thanks them for responding so generously always. He has friends all over the Rosses and Gweedore. He is very fond of Glencolmcille and was delighted to be invited to the official oepning of the Letterkenny Folk Festival on one occasion. He says that, like Gene Tunney and Rocky Marciano, he retired undefeated from his position as Lord Mayor of the Rosses. He feels that sooner or later, they will see the light out in Maghery and crown him King. Among his

school friends he remembers John Gorman (R.I.P), James McBrearty (Ardara), Andy and Michael Carr and "Big" Frank O'Donnell (Kilcar), a one time Co. Donegal footballer. He also remembers going to school with Nora Galligan's mother and sister! They lived in the Quay Rd. cottages then. His last word was for Pat Nora, whom he describes as "one of the best", not forgetting his good wife, Ann, and the wonderful M.F.D. Committee. He says Dungloe should never forget the last five years.




