The Buddy Bear Appeal

Two little Donegal children, Victoria Kilpatrick, aged 3 years from Romelton and Paul Gallagher aged 2⁺/₂ from Letterkenny who suffer from cerebral Palsy will be going with their patents to the world famous Peto institute in Budapest. Hungary on June 19th for a two week period of therapy. This therapy, known as Conductive Education has been developed by the Peto Institute to motivate and teach disabled children the ability to function in society despite the motor disorder. It is taught by specially trained teachers called conductors. Peto is now the world headquarters for the method of Conductive Education.

Cerebral Palsy is a condition caused by damage to the brain, before, during or after birth. The brain damage results in the inability to co-ordithe muscles and movements thus causing physical disability.

For Vicky and Paul it is hoped this trip and possibly many more over the next few years will help in the process of training them to walk and to talk which they can't do at present. It will however cost many thousands of pounds to fund this treatment and so on Friday 12th May at the Mount Errigal Hotel, Letterkenny the two little children were present when Mr Fergus Cleary, Donegal Person of the Year launched the Buddy Bear Appeal. The Buddy Bear Appeal is a campaign to send children like Vicky and Paul who suffer from Cerebral Palsy and who will benefit from Conductive Education to the Peto Insti-

. It was set up over a year ago when four business-men in DUNGAN-NON, Co. Tyrone come together to help one child with Cerebral Palsy. It is now registered as a trust whose objectives are:

a) to send children to the Peto Institute.

b) to help establish an Institute in Dungannon, which would serve all of Ireland and possibly Scotland and which would be staffed by conductors-the specially trained teachers trained in Hungary.

c) To raise public awareness.

d) To make appropriate arrangements to provide conductive education for registered Buddy Bear Members who will benefit from it.

At the Letterkenny meeting chairman of the group Mr Brendan Mc Conville, a charismatic and powerful emotive speaker told how it all came about.

"The image we had was of a child in a locked room in total darkness, crying for help."

He said these were children with active minds, trapped inside their own bodies.

On March 24 last year, the group asked people to come together, regardless of religion, to help unlock that door for the children and "let in a little light".

Since then, the campaign known as the Buddy (Budapest) Bear Appeal had snowballed.

Mr Mc Conville said it was supported by politicians and church leaders alike, including Ian Paisley and John Hume.

The Buddy Bear Trust has a white Teddy bear as its symbol. "It's a bear of hope," said Mr McConville," like some of our children who can't hug their parents' it can't close it's arms."

The Buddy Bear Appeal has already sent over 30 children to Hungary and at the Letterkenny meeting Mrs Cathy O'Donnell from Derry told how her little son Kevin aged 4 had benefited from the trip. The programme started at the Institute with the child has to be continued by the parents when they come back home and Mrs O'Donnell said it involved seven hours of hard work every day. However she says little Kevin can now for the first time stand up, feed himself and drink and is also a lot brighter.

Since the local Buddy Bear Appeal was launched on behalf of Vicky and Paul a fund raising campaign has got under way and a host of events and functions are planned over the coming weeks. It is a very, very worthy cause and hopefully the people of Donegal will respond with their traditional generosity. Should you wish to help please contact any of the Committee members:

JUNE IN THE GARDEN

How we all enjoyed that week of lovely sunshine in early May which sure worked wonders in our own gardens. But what a contrast! The following week we took all the weathermen doled out to us: Rain, hail, sleet, showers and mighty frosts. Such extremes of weather can give our more tender plants a set-back. However, let us all look forward to June, hoping that it will live up to that old adage that "June is bursting out all over". June is the most colourful month of the gardening year when our roses should be looking their best. Also a host of perennials: lupins, Aquilegia, Sweet Williams to name but a few, should be in their full colour and bring a dazzling display before the annuals make their debut. Watch out for Greenfly on the Lupins and the first sign give them a good spray with any pesticide which you can easily buy in any garden shop or store.

In the heather bed, with a pair of sharp scissors, clip off any dead stems back to new growth and any withered or dead flower heads. Give a liberal dressing of Peat-Moss, with a little general fertiliser



added, working it in well around the base of the plant. Rockery plants should respond well to similar treatment but add a little sharp sand to the peat moss and fertiliser working it well in to the crevices. Dead head polyanthus as soon as they are finished flowering and if you want their bed for your annuals, dig them out and divide the roots and plant in a corner until Autumn when you can replant them again once the annuals' flowering season is over. Don't forget to keep that hoe busy, keeping those weeds at bay.

All for now. Happy gardening.

Few people under the age of fifty in the North West to-day will remember the railway and the trains that plied daily between Burtonport and Derry city from the dawn of the century right up to 1940. The normal schedule was two trains up and two down, passing each other at Creeslough station. the up-train from the 'Port' sat at this station until the down-train from Derry arrived, as did the up-train that left the 'Port at noon the event occurring twice a day. They were a fascinating feature of the land, and no matter how pressing a man's chores in field or on the moor, he always straightened his back to watch the train out of sight.


At the station were meeting places for most teenagers, especially in the Winter when the emigrants usually returned home from their seasonal occupations abroad. Of course many people had occasion to go there to meet relatives disembarking, but many of the care-free 'high-spirited' type went there for less altruistic reasons. Platform lights were few and far between, and even if there had been more of them, their range of illumination was limited because they were of the wick type and fueled by crude Colza Oil. As the train began to move out in the semi darkness any passenger naive enough to stick his head out the window through curiosity, was likely to be the recipient of a sudden' dundulan' on the jaw, and woe betide any man who had recently bought himself a new bonnet to impress the lassies at home, because the swiping of such articles from unsuspecting heads was the paramount ambition of many miscreants who went there for no other purpose.

In the early part of the century, the foot-plate staff, such as the driver and fireman were not available in the Burtonport region and for several years the men manning the trains were natives of Derry or the periphery of that city, and this remained true until suitable staff capable of taking over the occupation were at last available at the western terminus. I knew most of those men by sight from 1925 onwards, having been born in a gatehouse, and a few friendly waves daily from the engine staff was a great boom to a little boy whose childish aspirations were to be an engine driver one day himself. In later years when I became an employee of the Company myself I encountered many people who had been on the railway all their lives, and related many anecdotes droll, hilarious and sometimes tragic.

In the late twenties, the Derry engine was manned by two worthies, one of which resided in the city itself and another who was a native of Muff. I know their names but since some of their families are still alive it would not be judicial to name them here. So for the sake of avoiding confusion I will call the driver who came from Derry, "Tierney' and the fireman from Muff 'Hannigan". Now Tierney was a true blue Orangeman who was certain that all history started at the Boyne, while his mate was of the opposite persuasion and a stalwart bulwark of his own beliefs. Most of the year, the pair were on very amiable terms with the exception of the second week of July, when the 'Twelfth' was approaching and the Lambeg drum due to be polished and dusted again. Needless to say July was the same as any other month to Hannigan, but it was the highlight of the year for Tierney. Hostilities would commence by Tierney ceasing all forms of conversation and resorted to whistling 'Lullibulero' as a substitute. Not to be out-done, Hannigan counteracted this maddening intimidation, not by singing or whistling, but by producing his rosary beads and kneeling down on the foot-plate appealing loudly to the Mother Of God to save the engine-driver from eternal damnation. Apart from this puerile behaviour they never resorted to violence, although a man from Meenaweel was reputed to have seen them at each other's throats one morning as the train chugged at snail's pace through a cutting. But knowing Meenaweel men as well as I do, I'm inclined to attribute his 'vision' to an halucinary backwash from a night of over indulgence in Paddy Og's. However once July was over and all the martial tramping done, the team on the engine became as amiable and friendly as before.

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Apart from this fanatical obsession with all things Orange, Tierney had other eccentric quirks albeit much less objectionable. for instance he would keep putting silver coins aside over a period of weeks until he had the equivalent of a fivepound note. As most stations carried money accrued from passenger tickets and the more Lucrative collection of freight tariffs, this meant that Tierney had as many as ten banks at his disposal along the line. At Burtonport he would exchange the silver for paper money which he would flaunt about arrogantly. between the 'Port' and the next station he would become less fascinated with the promissory note on considering that it might be easier to lose than the bulky silver. So when the next station came along he converted the money again and so on all and all the note changed hands many times a week. In the end, the stationmasters would have the cash ready for him every day to save time.







GRANDMOTHER'S BEAUTY WISDOM

Treatment for Dry Skin: If your skin is dry, apply face packs made from the yolk of an egg into which a few drops of lemon juice have been beaten. If the skin is so dry that it is flaking, after washing your face, dry thoroughly and apply a softening cream composed of 1/3 oz of lard mixed with a pinch of zinc oxide (obtainable from a chemist). Why do people eat wholefoods? There are many different reasons, one of the main ones being health.


Today many doctors are telling us that by changing our diet, we can avoid many of the diseases that plague our western world, e.g. tooth decay, caused by the most common additive, sugar.

That in full is said to be the Orangemen's toast and as one who has had the dubious experience of being tried by that august body, I can assure you each man-jack of them meant every word. 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THE GUILFORD FOUR


In last December's edition of the Leader (Vol 1, No. 6) we focused on the plight of Carol Richardson, one of so called Guilford Four who would be spending her curteenth Christmas behind bars. Carol Richardson, Gerard Conlon, Patrick Armstrong and Paul Hill were jailed for life in 1975 for the Guilford and Woolwich pub bombings. The four maintained their innocence from the start and it is almost universally accepted, nowadays, that they were framed. and are completely innocent. The IRA Balcombe street gang, in fact, later admitted responsibility for the bombings, but in the highly emotional aftermath of this senseless carnage, results had to be shown- hence the framing of the Guilford 4. Many prominent people, including churchmen and politicians, have called for their release.

In our December, '88 edition, we told how the British home secretary, Douglas Hurd, was facing mounting pressure to send their case back to the court of appeal and he was expected to announce his decision after Christmas. Well, he did announce his decision - in April, and the court will look at the case - in October. Why the dragging of feet? Simly because Maggie Thatcher, Douglas Hurd and the whole rotten the king British Legal System and Political System is not willing to face up to this grave miscarraige of Justice. Innocent people must be sacrificed to save face so the Guilford four are put on the long finger. Hopefully, the media will go away, people will forget and they can rot away in jail.

Please, please, let's open their eyes for them and beg them to get up off their knees. With the elections coming up, now is the time for action.

Before voting for any election candidate, ask them what they're doing to put right this terrible wrong.





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More working days are lost through mental problems than through strikes.

Before the age of 17, boys are more likely to need psychiatric help: after this age women are more likely to need help.

When emotions get out of hand and reactions are out of all "normal" proportion - this is the beginning of mental illness

People become mentally ill when they can no longer cope with the stresses and problems in their lives.

Mental illness is often a temporary condition. It can be treated successfully, although the possibility of a relapse can never be ruled out. One person in nine will be affected by

mental illness at some point in his/her life. Although some people are more likely to

become mentally ill than others, it is impossible to predict who will be affected.

People who have a mental illness need to be accepted need help to find work and accommodation without prejudice need to have sympathetic support and friendship. With this kind of help they can begin to pick up the pieces in their lives again.



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
