Farewell to Eddie's Cafe

A few years ago Letterkenny Shopping Centre was built. It was a drastic change for the town and its people. We were made aware of this new venture well in advance and we waited excitedly until it opened. However, most people are unaware of the changes in store for our town today. You may have noticed buildings disappearing at the Square and on the Main Street. This, however, is only the start of what is to come. Apparently the town is to undergo major changes in the coming months.

Among these changes will be the knocking down of the Centre Spot Restaurant at Lower Main Street - known to all as Eddie's Cafe. I spoke to Mr. Eddie Deery, the owner of the Cafe who said he was concerned that the public has not been well informed of developments nned for Letterkenny. Eddie's Cafe

has been in operation for twenty years and has been a half-way house to the public and to people of the Gaeltacht areas. With its imminent closure it is perhaps an opportune time to pay tribute to Eddie and his staff for their years of great service, friendliness and last but not least their great food. Sadly, it is only a matter of weeks before the cafe will close for a period to undergo modernisation. The old style, warm, traditional cafe will be no more and in it's place will come a modern, unformed cafe. Salt and Vinegar and spoonfulls of sugar will be replaced with the little sachets used nowadays by all modern cafes. Need I say more ! For a cafe steeped in history Eddie's will certainly be missed.

Among other major changes in the town the original Boyle's Bar of the Square which disappeared a few weeks ago will be transformed into an American Bar and Restaurant. Work is in progress at the moment on this development.

Also in store is the complete transformation of the Main Street with the pavement being replaced by red brick and the rebuilding of the Market Square.

Just a Little Bit of Religion... what is the Bahá'í Faith ?

The Baha'i Faith is the youngest of the world's independent religions. Having grown from the teachings of Baha'u'llah (the Glory of God) (1817-92) and the suffering and lifeblood of 20,000 Iranian martyrs in the min-nineteenth century, it now embraces the peoples of all nations and countries whose evolution, like that of a human being's, is at present undergoing the turbulence and the pangs associated with adolescence which will culminate in its long-awaited maturity.

So fast and so effective have been the expansion and consolidation of this new religion since the Declaration of the Bab (the Gate) (1819-50), the youthful Prophet-Herald of Baha'u'llah, in May 1844, that is now numbers some 5 million people and is, after Christianity and Islam, the most widely spread of all religions. By 1987 there were Baha'is in nearly 120,000 centres representing more than 2,100 ethnic groups, and the sacred Writings of the Faith have been translated into over 750 languages. As one eminent Baha'i has commented: "The rapidity with which it has spread over the whole glove is further evidence that the Baha'i Faith is of God, not of man".

Some of the principal teachings of Baha'u'llah are:

- 1. The foundations of all religions are the same. There is only one God and all religions - whether Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity, Islam or the Baha'i Faith - are based on the progressive Revelation of that one God.
- 2. Religion must be the cause of love and unity.
- Religion must be in harmony with science and reason.
 The oneness and wholeness of the entire human race.
- The oneness and wholeness of the entire human race.
 The independent investigation of truth. One's faith is con ditioned by no one but himself or herself. Leaving aside all preconceived ideas and the blind imitation of others, one must seek truth for oneself.
- 6. Men and women should enjoy equal opportunity, rights and priveleges.
- 7. The elimination of all kinds of prejudice racial, economic, social, political, patriotic and religious.
- 8. A sound compulsory education for every child, irrespective of colour, race, creed or wealth.
- 9. A universal language should be taught, along with the mother tongue, throughout the world. This will eliminate the barriers of full expression between all peoples.
- 10. The spiritual solution of the economic problem. This requires an entirely new approach to the production and distribution of the earth's products so that there will be no extremes of poverty or of wealth.
- 11. The establishment of an international government so that differences between nations can be settled in accordance with justice and reason, and the provision of the neces

sary agencies for the safeguarding of a permanent and universal peace.

The Holy Spirit to be the prime motive power in human lives.

Baha'i Administration: Consultation in a frank and loving manner is thekeynote of all Baha'i Administration. There is no clerly and no ritual.

Administrative bodies are called Spiritual Assemblies which consist of 9 adult believers. These Assemblies are local, national and international and meet in a spirit of prayer.

These Spiritual Assemblies are elected by the people every year (April 21), but their responsibility is a trust from God to Whom alone they are answerable. There is no seeking for votes, no candidates, no platform promises, no parties. The watchword for the Baha'i Faith is unity in diversity and this is reflected in the Administration of each community.

The Nineteen Day Feast is a community occasion for the reading of prayers, discussion of affairs with the Spiritual Assembly and material refreshment.

The Universal House of Justice - an elected international body of 9 members constituted by Baha'u'llah as the Supreme Legislative and governing body of the Faith - carries out its duties at the Baha'i World Centre in Haifa in Israel.

Only members of the Baha'i Faith can contribute to the Baha'i Fund.

Confused, disillusioned, sceptical and restless, this new demands a new all-encompassing solution to its manifold ills and problems. Baha'is believe that this solution has been provided by the Almighty through the radiant healing Message revealed over 100 years ago by Baha'u'llah.

It was to Edward Granville Browne, the celebrated Oriental scholar of Cambridge University, that Baha'u'llah, in April 1890, addressed the following soul-stirring, heart-warming, worldshaking words:

"...we desire but the good of the world and the happiness of the nations; yet they deem us a stirrer of strife and sedition worthy of bondage and banishment...That all nations should become one in faith and all men as brothers; that the bonds of affection and unity between the sons of men should be strengthened; that diversity of religion should cease, and difference of race be annulled - What harm is there in this ?...Yet so it shall be; these fruitless strifes, these ruinous wars shall pass away, and the "most Great Peace" shall come..These strifes and this bloodshed and discord must cease, and all men be as one kindred and one family...Let not a man glory in this, that he loves his country; let him rather glory in this, that he loves his kind..."

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A VISIT IS A MUST

August in the Garden

So August is once more with us, introducing all the various Autumn colours of dahlias, Phlox, heleniums to name but a few. Our gardens suffered severely from the lack of moisture during the prolonged drought but should pick up enough now, with the recent rains to give us a reasonable good Autumn display. As every gardener will be aware of, it has been a summer of green r and all the other pests you could

mention and now this is the time when the earwigs tackle the dahlias. If you care to look carefully at the foliage and find some of the leaves shrivelled up and porous, you will know that these pests are active. Unfortunately there is nothing much you can do in the line of spraying to exterminate these blighters and they operate at night and are back under cover during the day. But there is a simple and inexpensive method to keep them at bay. Collect a few old bean or pea cans and stuff about 2 ins deep of dried grass or straw in the bottom. Have a few rods or canes handy, near to the same height as your dahlia plant, push one or two into the soil as near to the roots as possible, upend your tins on the rods, making sure that the grass is tightly packed and dry which is very important. First thing in the morning, shake out the straw and if earwigs have been attacking your dahlias you will find them there. Dispose of them and repeat the procedure.

The perennials should be rewarding us well, with all the attention we gave them earlier on in the season. Now is a good time to examine their whereabouts and to plan for next year. Sometimes we buy a perennial plant which is new to us and plant it in a suitable position. As it grows and develops we find we have it in the wrong location. Either is much too big for the bed, doesn't get enough sun etc. So now is the time to check on your perennials and plan your herbaescious border for next year. Of course deadhead as soon as their flowering season is over.


In the rock garden, with a pair of sharp scissors, trim off any dead stems and flower heads and again take stock of the plants which are best suited to their siting. No doubt you will have a few spaces where plants have died during the dry spell, now is a good time to replace them so that they are well established before the winter.







WHOLEFOOD

Changing to wholefoods for health or sport reasons should be done slowly - a little at a time. Change your everyday food slightly. Try making wholemeal pastry instead of white flour pastry. Slowly cut down your sugar intake by putting less and less in cakes and making the types of cakes that use dried fruit as a sweetener.

We will now go through the different types of foods:

1. Grains: Each whole grain contains all the nourishment needed to foster the development of a new plant. Brown rice for example contains 7.5% protein, including all 12 of the vital amino acids: calcium, iron, sodium, potassium, phosphorous, vitamins B1 and B2 and carbohydrate. As in all grains, the main food value is to be found in the outer layers (brown rice has 7 skins) which are generally removed for human consumption.

Cooking whole grains - use a heavy (cast iron is best) pot with a tight fitting lid. Pressure cooking is good for the harder grains like brown rice, wheat, barley and rye. The more water used, the softer the grains, but the longer the cooking time. Generally one cup of grain will feed two hungry people. Use 2 or 3 times the amount of water to grain. Never stir grains while cooking in water. Always let them boil dry although you can add more water if necessary.

‡ ARTHRITIS

Cherries are said to be effective because they seem to help prevent crystallization of urie acid and to reduce the urie acid levels in the blood. It is also said that cherries have been known to help the arthritic bumps on knuckles disappear.

EAT CHERRIES! any kind—sweet or sour, fresh, canned or frozen, black, Royal Anne or Bing. DRINK CHERRY JUICE! available without preservatives or sugar added, and also in a concentrated form at health food stores.

One source says to eat cherries and drink the juice throughout the day for 4 days, then stop for 4 days and then start all over again. Another source says to eat up to a dozen cherries a day in addition to drinking a glass of cherry juice. Find a happy medium by using your own good judgment as to cherry dosage. Listen to your body. You'll know soon enough if the cherries seem to be making you feel better.

Steep 1 cup of fully packed parsley in 1 quart of boiling water. After 15 minutes, strain and refriger-

DOSE: ½ cup before breakfast. ½ cup before dinner and ½ cup anytime pain is particularly severe.

> Quite often scorch marks can be removed by washing in warm water and soap. Little can be done, as it is the material which is damaged. White material can be bleached with peroxide.

Wholewheat Pastry

Ingredients: 100g (4ozs) wholewheat flour Pinch salt 50g (2ozs) butter or oil Water to mix.



Place flour in bowl, add fat and salt and rub in. Add water to form a soft ball of dough. Leave to rest for 30 mins before using. Cook at 200°C, 425°C (Gas 7) for 20 mins.

12 THE LONGEST TRAIN

The unfortunate man who receives a sentence of fifty years in jail will think that such a period will never pass, yet when the same man looks back at fifty years of his past life, the period seems no longer than a year or two at the most. For a person in a desperate predicament, the seconds seem to take ages to elapse, and a spell of two minutes seem as long as a year. This phenomenon is just an illusion generated by the hopelessness generated by the specific dilemma in question.

On a warm Harvest Day nearly seventy years ago, a Meenaweel man whom I knew well was cutting his corn at leisure in a field well above the railway line that passed on over the moor to Burtonport in the West. It was 1921 to be precise and the whole of Ireland in a trouble that was to culminate in a tragic Civil War. The railway had been operating for over a score of years and though its purpose was to transport merchandise from the port of Derry, for some sinister reason it was built miles away from the areas where most of the people lived. It skipped Creeslough by a mile, Falcarragh by four and the station for the township of Dungloe was two miles away. This gave the notion that the line was not for the benefit of the populace at all, but for some other sinister purpose such as the speedy carriage of troops and their armaments., as indeed it was used many a time.

Well, as I said, the day was warm and as the man from Meenaweel never straightened his back for more than two hours and towards mid-day he decided that he merited a smoke and on going to the top of the field to find his jacket, he discovered that he was out of tobacco. The nearest store was Paddy Og's half a mile away on the other side of the rail, and along with selling groceries it was a tavern as well as it is to this day. now the reaper was not going without his whiff and he decided to go to the store for an ounce of plug, and from what I remember of the same man, I expect he was intent on lubricating his throat as well. Now he could follow the railway fence along to the dry arch where there was a path leading to the roadway or he could

The carriages were packed with soldiers with heads sticking out every blessed window and some of them with their bodies stuck out right down to their buckles. From the uniforms they wore he recognised them as "Black and Tans' and from all the roaring and bellowing they were engaged in it was obvious that the whole lot were mad drunk. Any crow or moorhen that appeared on the mountain side was fired at indiscriminately and a loud hurra greeted every target struck. This regiment was the most indisci-

plined of all the British forces in Ireland in the trouble times, having been criminals freed from English jails on condition that they would do duty in Ireland where ambushes and arson were common. The atrocities they committed

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were reported all over the world because they used their guns anywhere and at any time they choose, whether commanded to do so or not. Their favourite pastime was taking pot-shots at cattle grazing in the fields and they were known to have fired at people also, and maiming them for life. If they acted in this manner when they were sober there was no telling what they would do while The man on the fence inebriated. thought of running for his life but on remembering that this would present the trigger-happy mob with a tantilising target, which even the most disciplined solder would be tempted to fire at, but before he could make up his mind what to do the train was already upon him and his only chance now was to sit as still as a statue, not even moving an eyelid or smack his lips. He resorted to praying with all the sincerity he could muster as he was sure he was going to hear the last shot in his life any minute. He sank into a trauma of stupidity and all the world about him seemed to be a hazy dream in which many things an many thoughts occurred at the san time. Well whether it was the pallour of his face or the grey bawneen shirt he was wearing merging into the grey slopes behind him coupled by the fact that they might have been so drunk as to have their vision impaired, the soldiers did not seem to survive was the end of the train disappearing into the cutting on his left and out of harm's way. He was so relieved that he did not wait to climb down from his perch but let himself all into the heather and lay there for a few minutes co-ordinating his senses. He leapt like a greyhound over the second fence and within a few minutes he ran panting into the pub and flung himself down on a bag of meal as he ordered a gill of brandy. There were several men drinking at the bar whom he knew.

"Was that the mid-day train going by ?", asked one of them.

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THE PADDY TUNNEY COLUMN Of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity

You sons of France arise and conquer; see the glorious light shines in the sky Tyrants host with furious shouting; see their blood-stained banners on high. And so on.

So we have reached the Bi-Centennial of the French Revolution, when man born free but found to be everywhere in chains was promised full liberty. The Bastille was stormed, the guillotine worked overtime to keep noble and aristocratic heads rolling and fodder enough was provided to keep novelists chewing the cud for many years to come.

Dickens in time wrote his fine novel "A Tale of Two Cities" and of course the popular hero on the side of the unfortunate nobility was unquestionably the Scarlet Pimpernell.

"They seek him there, they seek him there,

These French they seek him everywhere, Is he in Heaven or is he in Hell, That Damned elusive Pimpernell".

Indeed he put poor,wine-sodden Syndey Carton in the penny place.

In time came the re-action to the excesses of the Revolution and the guillotining of Robespierre himself. Eventually the field was left open for the Great Napoleon Boneparte to establish one of the mightiest empires of all time and to "sweep the world for gain" as the song says.

One wonders had Boneparte come to Ireland instead of heading for Egypt

would the pages of history tell a different story? It is interesting to note that when the Great Bonaparte was dying in Saint Helena he stated that "nothing was ever gained by physical force". And he should have known ! Hot-heads of today please note.

In fact many French men believe that it was his fierce and incessant espousal of the Rights of Man sewed the seeds of the Revolution. It is refreshing to note that the great writer, Voltaire, was imprisoned for several period of time in the Bastille for his forthright and fearless attacks on the repression and tyranny prevalent in France at the time. His slaughtering of Sacred Cows infuriated the powers that be and eventually, after the death of his patroness, Madame du Chatelet, at whose country seat he had stayed for fifteen years, he was induced to pay a prolonged visit to the Court of Frederick the Great. While there he completed his important historical work - Essay on Customs or "Essai Sur Les Maeurs et L'Esprit des Nations", and began his Philosophic Dictionary.

However he could not for long agree with Frederick and left Prussia in 1773.

Not safe in his native France he fled to Switzerland and settled down near Geneva at a place called Ferney. During the next twenty years until his death in 1778 he was at his brilliant best as a writer and within these two decades he wrote his dialogues and his most popular novel - Candide.

In this book his genius as a story teller is admirably demonstrated and even in English translation, the work sparkles with subtle wit and uproarious laughter. The philosopher character, Pangloss has no peer in European literature outside Cervantes' Don Quixote, and his declaration that "all is best in this best possible of worlds" has become a household saying where Voltaire is unknown.

Still, the advice of the wise man given to Candide to "go home and convate his garden" has more relevance for us today wandering around in a morass of immoral and materialistic effluence.

No wonder his contemporaries regarded him as the equal of Homer and Virgil !


